

Police taking supplies to homes isolated in the floods

From the SES volunteers braving dangerous flood waters to rescue people from their homes and the businesses that went out of their way to ensure that people had medications, food and basics, the flood has seen some extraordinary acts of courage and kindness.

The video of Simon from Hawkesbury Houseboats who jumped into a boat to head off a rogue container on the river at Wiseman's Ferry, steering it away from hitting a line of moored houseboats, was just one of the amazing images from the past few days.

There was pharmacist Lizzy Gripper at Windsor who packed crates of medication that had to be taken by helicopter to North Richmond, the Fire and Rescue NSW helicopter at Windsor being packed with groceries to restock stores the other side of the river and the police and SES boats out and about rescuing people and their pets.

Staff at clubs such as The Richmond Club who helped set up an evacuation centre and then assisted evacuating those in caravans at the Wanderest Travellers Park.

Castle Hill RSL and Castle Hill Showground were also centres for evacuation. See stories on pages 5, 11, 12 and 22.

Then there were residents who did everything to help friends and neighbours and organisations who filled thousands of sandbags.

Hawkesbury and Hills Council staff were out and about helping. Hawkesbury Mayor Patrick Conolly and Hills Mayor Michelle Byrne urged people to reach out for help.

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Hills to Hawkesbury

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FLOOD FATALITY

A 25-year-old man driving to work for his first day as a contractor with a large commercial organisation was found dead in his hire car several metres below the water in Cattai Creek, next to Cattai Ridge Road Bridge, in Glenorie at 1.10pm onWednesday, (March 24).

The Western Sydney man called emergency services at about 6.25am saying he had driven into flood waters and his vehicle was sinking.

The 000 operator stayed talking to the man but lost contact with him at 7.04am.

Officers from The Hills Police Area Command attended the scene on Cattai Ridge Road, near Hidden Valley Lane, along with SES Flood Rescue, shortly afterwards but could not find the vehicle.

Police divers located the vehicle, which was 6 metres under water, just after 1pm. Detective Inspector Chris Laird said there were signs that the man had tried to get out of the car but had not been able to.

Det Insp Laird said that the padlocked gate across the road was 10m under water and could not be seen. He confirmed that there were road closure signs on the road.

He said the man was a Pakistani national who had been living in Australia for some time. He has not yet been formally identified. He said his friends were devastated.

He said the 25-year-old had been driving a brand new Toyota Camry hire car.

"We can only speculate why he couldn't get out of the car initial examinations show he made all reasonable attempts and that will form part of our inquiries as to why



he couldn't leave the car," said Det Insp Laird

He said part of the investigation would look at whether the electrics failed, preventing him from getting out of the car.

He said the coronial investigations would also look at whether the closure of the road was properly visible enough at

the time of the incident. Insp Laird said the locked gates across the road could were under water and could not been seen from the road way at all.

"What happened was a complete tragedy."

He said it was a very sad reminder not to attempt to drive into flood waters.





CAREFLIGHT FLOOD RESCUES

A seriously ill 50-year-old woman was airlifted to hospital by CareFlight on Monday (March 22) when floodwaters in North Richmond prevented her from going to hospital by road.

She had a serious infection that required urgent medical care.

CareFlight's Rapid Response Helicopter was tasked by NSW Ambulance at 6.10pm and landed 25 minutes later within the grounds of a sporting facility.

CareFlight's specialist doctor and NSW Ambulance critical care paramedic performed a clinical assessment on the woman. They conducted an ultrasound on the patient and prepared her for flight transfer to hospital. She was airlifted to Westmead Hospital in a serious condition.

Earlier in the afternoon the CarerFlight helicopter airlifted a 37-year-old pregnant woman in labor to hospital when floodwaters in North Richmond prevented her from going to hospital by road.

She was being transported by NSW Ambulance paramedics when flooding from the Nepean River prevented their crossing.

CareFlight's Rapid Response Helicopter was tasked by NSW Ambulance at 3:50pm and landed 20 minutes later on the road of Beaumont Avenue, North Richmond,

NSW Ambulance paramedics handed over the patient to CareFlight's specialist doctor and NSW Ambulance critical care paramedic who performed a clinical assessment on the woman.

The woman was airlifted to Nepean Hospital in a stable condition under ongoing monitoring from CareFlight's clinical team.

CAR JACKING

An 18-year-old woman has been charged in relation to an alleged carjacking at Castle Hill on Tuesday (March 23).

Officers from The Hills Police Area Command were called to Gilbert Road, near Caterson Drive, Castle Hill, at about 4.40am on Tuesday after a 40-year-old man, driving a Holden Commodore, said he was flagged down by a woman claiming to be injured.

He said he stopped to help her and was subsequently threatened by two men armed with a knife. The men and woman stole the Commodore and fled the scene. A red Honda Jazz with two occupants was seen to follow the Commodore from the area.

Police attended a unit at Kellyville on Wednesday (March 24) at about 8pm and arrested an 18-year-old woman.

She was taken to Castle Hill Police Station and charged with aggravated take/drive motor vehicle with person in/on it - in company and aggravated take/drive motor vehicle with person in/on it - armed with weapon.

As investigations continue, police are appealing for anyone with information about the incident, or the identity of the men, to come forward.

One man is described as being about 180-185cm tall, aged between 16 and 20, wearing a white hooded-jumper and black jacket. The second male was wearing a black face mask and a black cap. Inquiries are continuing.

STABBING ARRESTS

Three teenagers have been charged after a man was allegedly stabbed at a home in Rouse Hill earlier this month.

Emergency services were called to a home on Cornell Place at about 9.30pm on Saturday March 6 where officers from The Hills Police Area Command found a 22-year-old man with a single stab wound to his back.

He was treated by NSW Ambulance paramedics and taken to Westmead Hospital and underwent surgery.

Detectives from The Hills Police Area Command conducted a search warrant at Schofields on Thursday, March 18 and arrested a 17-year-old male. He was charged with wound person with intent to cause grievous bodily harm and common assault.

An 18-year-old man was arrested at Castle Hill on Saturday, March 20 and charged with assault occasioning actual bodily harm and common assault. A third male - aged 17 - was arrested at a house in Beaumont Hills on Monday March 22. He was taken to Castle Hill Police Station and charged with two counts of common assault.

DRUG HOUSE

A \$61, 5000 Hydroponic Cannabis Crop has been seized in Carlingford.

Hills Police dismantled a hydroponic cannabis operation set up in a residential home on North Rocks Road, Carlingford on Monday (March 22).

Police were alerted at 4pm. The owners tried to do an inspection of the rental property and a real estate contacted police. Police discovered 123 plants at the property.

Enquiries are continuing.

Station at Rouse Hill at about 4.10pm following reports of a stabbing. Officers attached to The Hills Police Area Command found a 16-year-old girl with injuries to her arm and chest.

PROVIDING A SAFE HAVEN

Hundreds of people have been finding support and comfort at Castle Hill RSL following flood evacuations along the Hawkesbury River.

Castle Hill RSL was named a Flood Evacuation Centre and started accepting people, some with their pets, from Sunday.

The management team and staff rallied together to convert the club's auditorium, luxe lounge and other areas into a processing centre to assist authorities, and act as a respite centre for those in need.

SES members, police, ambulance, NSW Health, Red Cross, Salvation Army, Anglicare and Chaplains were at the centre to help evacuees register and get help with crisis assistance.

The Club supplied sleeping and showering facilities, hot food and drinks and a safe dry area for evacuees and their pets until assistance could be arranged.

Some waited for family and friends and others were given temporary hotel accommodation.

NSW State Emergency Services (SES) Commissioner, Carlene York (pictured) visited the centre on Wednesday.

CHRG CEO David O'Neil said: "CHRG prides itself on being a community hub for people to come together for friendship, support and social interaction.

"The Group is proud to be able to support our community at this

challenging time of need and work with the incredible women and men from SES, Police, community support agencies and volunteering partners to provide shelter, food and comfort at this time."

"The effort of all of these people, and the work of the CHRG team, has been fantastic and our facility is ideally suited to provide much of the infrastructure required to manage such a complex operation — from control centres to infectious disease isolation areas and shelter for people and their pets."

"It is confronting to see families sleeping with their belongings and pets in our function rooms, not knowing if they will have a home to return to. However, despite their adversity, everyone has been incredibly appreciative of the club and the various support teams, which is extremely humbling considering what they are going through. Times like these bring out the very best in our communities."

"This will be a long journey back, and whilst the club has been directly impacted by the loss of our Golf Course at Pitt Town, this doesn't even compare with the loss of people's homes and lives. We will be there to help where we can, well into the future."

RDA A GALLOPING SUCCESS By LAWRENCE MACHADO

The benefits of working with animals are immense for people with disabilities and the Riding for Disabled NSW Tall Timbers Centre at Box Hill confirms this.

Maureen Richardson is grateful for the positive impact of RDA's programs on her granddaughter Violet, 10.

"When Violet first went to the centre, she was excited but very frightened near the horses," Richardson said. "But under the guidance of the head coach, Violet learned a lot about these animals. Now she rides once a week and has gone from being a frightened girl around horses, to gaining a lot in self-esteem. The RDA program is so beneficial, practical and provides real life experience, thanks to the wonderful volunteers. Violet loves it so much that told me that 'I am going to work at Tall Timbers one day."

Over the past 10 years, more than 1500 participants enjoyed the centre's programs, including 104 for the second half of last year.

Respected staff coach Nicole King has been at RDA for many years along with administrator Kerry Souter.

"Although COVID-19 shut us down for some time during 2020, we were still able to get back to a reduced program in the second half of the year," says Nicole.

"In addition to Groundwork programs for life skills to be learnt, we introduced allied health services, including occupational therapy and speech pathology, and soon counselling. Fundraising has been difficult over the last few years and definitely with Covid-19 now impacting, it is very difficult to plan and run fundraising events into the future. We are not government funded and our participation fees cover approximately 20 percent of our



core program costs, including horses, staff and property maintenance.

"We are looking at other avenues such as corporate partnerships and our allied health services to support the ongoing operations; we do so to try and keep the costs to our service users affordable."

Volunteers, like Kirsty Hardman, play a huge role at the centre, because there are 170 shifts to be filled each week if it's at full capacity.

Kirsty, a speech pathologist, coordinates a group of young riders once a week. "I have been a volunteer at RDA for 16 and half years, and I love it, because it brings a sense of achievement," she said. "We feel excited when they gain a new skill and their smiles make it so worthwhile. You don't need to be a rider to volunteer at the RDA, as there is something for everyone."

Nicole says volunteer roles include working in their programs, helping in the stables, gardening, property maintenance and cleaning in addition to committee, fundraising or coaching roles. "COVID-19 has certainly impacted our volunteering levels and we are seeking to increase the consistency of volunteers across all areas," she said

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Thousands of hungry worms are connecting residents in a North Kellyville apartment complex and improving outcomes for the environment.

The Hills Shire Council is running the threemonth Worm Farm trial, the first of its kind by a council in Australia, and if the La'Hay family's response is anything to go by it is already a raging success with 84kg of landfill saved in the first two weeks.

Residents Paul and Kerry La'Hay say the biggest impact has been on their daughter.

"We joined the trial because we are trying to create a community for our daughter Simone," said Paul. "Simone is a real livewire and she absolutely loves people."

He said Simone took around 2kg worth of scraps each week to spread over the worm farm. "It gives Simone a chance to interact with people on a different level and the people in the complex enjoy interacting with her."

The 'skip bin-sized' worm farm, supplied by Worms Downunder, is located in a carpark – just beneath the complex.

It houses roughly 120,000 (30kg of) worms, which produce both worm castings and worm tea for the building to use in their shared garden plots and on their balcony verandas. Paul said it was great putting vegetable and fruit scraps to good use rather than throwing them in the red topped bin.

"We were chucking so much away, now it goes to the worm farm. In the first two weeks Regent Honeyeater Grove 20 pilot residences saved 84kg of landfill," he said..

Marie Akkary who is leading the 22 families involved said: "Their enthusiasm has been amazing and we wouldn't be able to do this without them. Growing up I watched my grandparents utilise their food scraps for the garden. (Their)



garden was the most lush, fertilised soil I've ever seen ... as a result their garden always produced the tastiest fruit and vegetables. I wanted to share this with others especially the youth in our complex. Having them involved in this project not only provides education but a sense of importance for our next generation. "

She is also informing non-participating residents about the process. "This project has brought our community closer together. It's been wonderful."

The project has been applauded by Hills Shire Mayor Dr Michelle Byrne: "A worm farm is fairly low maintenance, and it's a great way to process food waste. Worm tea and castings is highly regarded as a powerful natural fertiliser for plants."

Councillor Robyn Preston who has been advocating for such a trial said: "Apartments bring a massive increase in population and with that comes an increase in the food waste created by apartment occupants. Council is thinking creatively to find ways to manage this waste and recycling food scraps onsite has been something I have been advocating for," she said.

"I would like to see residents from other apartments adopting this recycling program if this trial is successful."

The organisation is working directly with Hawkesbury City Council, outreach teams, local charities and community groups to identify exactly what's needed. GIVIT then meets those needs through its online

warehouse, or by purchasing requested items locally using donated funds.

GIVIT is urging people to not send unrequested donations or bring unrequested donations into the impacted areas, or donations which can be bought locally. 100 per cent of the money GIVIT receives will be used to purchase essential items and services by people and communities impacted by the floods.

A spokesman said: "We want to make

sure local organisations aren't inundated with donations they don't need, by encouraging people to donate the smart way through our website, www.GIVIT.org.au

GIVIT encourages charities, services and community groups supporting people impacted to register to access donations. Registration is free. The Red Cross has also launched a flood appeal. Its volunteers and staff have been providing psychological first aid and support to thousands of people since the start of the disaster evacuation centres in flood affected areas in NSW.

"Gillian shepherded Alive 90.5 FM through very difficult times, bringing stability and certainty to the Station by consistently attracting sponsors and nurturing on-air talent.

"Gillian was always a positive and caring supporter of the station, presenters and me personally. I cannot thank Gillian enough."

Deputy Chair is volunteer presenter Darryn Capes-Davis who said: "Gillian and I worked hard over the last two years to improve the quality and reliability of our radio broadcast. We are sounding better than ever."

Gillian said what drew her to listening to Alive 90.5 nearly 20 years ago was the jazz program. "I called them up and they called me in for a chat and I used to go in and help and when people were away I would fill in. So I fell into it." Her Kaleidoscope program started 10 years ago and three years later she was asked to join the Board and five years ago became Chair.

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PARKINSON'S HELP By BEV JORDAN

Antonino is 69 and has had Parkinson's disease for two years, he also suffered a stroke several years before and is being cared for by wife Maria.

At the moment, he is at The Hills Private Hospital undergoing a rehabilitation program and is doing daily exercises to improve his mobility so that he can walk again.

Maria said caring for her husband has been very challenging because of his stroke and said that the care at The Hills Private was amazing, all she wanted was "for him to be able to walk again, just a few steps, and they have done that here".

Nurse Unit Manager Liz Davidson says the hospital helps a lot of patients with Parkinson's, a neurodegenerative brain disorder that progresses slowly in most people.

It is estimated that 1 in 350 Australians now have the condition, and more than 35 people are diagnosed daily.

Mrs Davidson said that people manage the condition well at home but often came to rehabilitation when they were experiencing reduced mobility, and decreased function with speech and swallowing.

"Through Physiotherapy and occupational therapy, we get people to their best functioning capacity. There are assessments, a lot of guidance and occupational therapy will do home visits to assess what is needed. Parkinson

medication can be quite complicated and we do a lot of education about the medications and how to manage them at home."

She said The Hills Private used a multidisciplinary approach with a weekly team meeting with family attended by doctors, nurses occupational therapy, physiotherapy and speech therapists to discuss the patient's rehabilitation.

She said many people with private health insurance who were struggling at home caring for a loved one who was having mobility issues did not realise that they could access rehabilitation services. The hospital also offers carers training.

"Patients don't have to be in a hospital to be referred for rehabilitation here. They can get a referral from their GP. If carers feel they need help they should go to their GP. I am amazed by how much functional mobility we get back for people to enhance their quality of life," she said.

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Horses, dogs, birds and goats called Castle Hill Showground home during the worst of this week's flooding.

One of the first to arrive on Sunday (March 21) was Windsor High School Agriculture Teacher Elizabeth Ruis with the school's 13 prize-winning dairy goats.

The determined teacher made a threehour journey from her home to take the school's much-loved herd to safety ahead of the floods.

In the 22 years, she's been teaching at the school this is the first flood evacuation she has had to undertake.

When the Hills and Hawkesbury Community News dropped in to Castle Hill Showground on Tuesday (March 23) Year 9 student Laura Shaw and her mum had turned up to care for the goats and give her teacher a much-earned break.

Mrs Ruis said: It's been great to be here, it is clean and dry and they are safe".

She said having the AWL mobile vet truck on hand had been excellent (see story page 22).

The determined teacher spent four days caring for the goats at Castle Hill Showground and took them back to Windsor High on Thursday (March 25).

Their next big outing is to Hawkesbury Showground on April 25 when all 13 are entered in the annual Hawkesbury Show.

Local Land Services spokeswoman said the evacuation centre at Castle Hill Showground had provided shelter for just over 60 animals, 34 horses, 10 dogs and 2 birds as well as the 13 goats.

Horse owner Coco Miles (pictured on the front page with Sapphire and Trigger) took 11 of their showjumpers to Castle Hill Showground and neighbouring equestrian Ludovic Bernadat took seven (Full story page 12).

The NSW Department of Primary Industries and Local Land Services are working together as Agriculture and Animal Services Functional Area - AASFA - to assist landholders and communities with animal welfare-related issues arising from the current fflood emergency in NSW.

This includes the provision of emergency fodder, animal assessment and veterinary assistance, stock euthanasia and disposal, livestock feeding and management advice, and care of animals in evacuation centres.

Anyone wishing to register for assistance, for emergency fodder or livestock support should call the Agriculture and Animal Services Hotline on 1800 814 647.

Landholders can also register damage and losses through the primary industries natural disaster damage survey, a simple online survey to record damage to primary production and animals from natural disasters such as floods, fires, and storms.

Horse owner Coco Miles from Windsor Stables on Pitt Town Road, McGarths Hill evacuated 26 horses with family, staff and friends on Sunday (March 21).

Most she said were dotted around at "family and friends places" but she took 11 to Castle Hill Showground where she has been living for the week.

Her family have been on the 60-acre property for nearly 20 years where they breed, train and coach show jumping horses.

It is the first time they have had to evacuate. "We had a plan. When the floods started coming in it was hard to know how it was going to progress, as they days went on it changed from being an ordinary Hawkesbury flood to the water really rising quickly.

"As soon as it started looking more than a low-level flood we started moving them to friends' places.

"Water did get to the house but we have a new facility that we only completed 18 months ago that's been inundated which included paddocks and shelters.'At the end of the day it's just stuff, the horses and people got out ok."

Ludovic Bernadat who runs Bernadat Equestrian at Oakville evacuated seven of his prized horses to Castle Hill Showground.

He says he only opened up the centre 18 months ago and most of it was under water. The damage bill will be huge but at least his family and horses got out safely.

On Thursday he was in a kayak surveying the flood damage to his equestrian centre.

RAL LIFE FOR A CITY GIRL

Ann Waters loves the rural life. She lives with her husband, daughter, two grandchildren, 30 chickens, four alpacas (which were a great attraction in February, the first Open Day of 2021), two dogs and two cats on a property in Kenthurst. Life is good.

Ann didn't start life in the country. She was born in Strathfield and for years moved many times with her parents and older brother to Balgowlah, Pymble, over to Auckland and back to Burwood

She had started hairdressing in New Zealand and continued in this profession on their return to Sydney. However, the harsh chemicals used for perms played havoc with her skin so she took a job in administration at Grace Brothers Broadway; a much safer option!

Life changed dramatically for Ann when at 20 she met Wally, her husband of 50 years. Like her parents, the couple took to moving often throughout their marriage as opportunities presented themselves to Wally, an electrical engineer. Sydney prices were high so they moved to Wollongong where Wally worked for BHP.

When his section was disbanded, he accepted a job in the Newcon Colliery, Lithgow. They bought 26 acres and lived in a caravan whilst building their home. There were only dirt roads and no electricity so conditions were very primitive. In the ensuing years, they paid for the electricity cable to be installed, which others then linked to, not contributing anything to the Waters' original installation. AUTUMN GARDe

The autumn tones are colouring the countryside. It is wonderful driving through The Hills area and seeing the changes. Maples, claret ash, liquid ambers and birch look colourful with their yellow leaves and white bark. Autumn is a great time to spend in the garden, planting out bulbs and ground covers.

Daffodils narcissus, the early golden daffodils "King Alfred" look best if planted in clumps. Freesias are fragrant and colourful. As it is cooler we can get those jobs done, raking the leaves and composting them or putting them through the mulcher.

The Camellia sasangua with their glossy green foliage and beautiful flowers are providing colour in the garden. They are popular garden plants and grow in a wide range of climate zones. They flower from autumn through winter and into spring.

Shrubs in flower at present are buddleia and davidii "Black Knight"- butterfly bush with arching branches and deep green leaves with conical clusters of nectar rich flowers.

Plectranthus argentatus is a low growing plant with silver-grey foliage plant in groups for visual impact.

Annuals and perennials also provide colour in the autumn garden, Gaura butterfly bush with pink and white flowers is looking great as are succulents such as Sedum "Autumn Joy" pink flowers and silver wax leaves.

Marigolds brighten the flower garden with yellow and orange flowers and the best contrast with blue salvias. Annuals require regular liquid fertiliser to promote strong growth.

Sweet Peas are usually planted on St Patrick's Day, March 17 they are fragrant and colourful. Plant about 2 cm in soil and shoots will appear in seven days.

Belladonna lilies pink and white flowers spring up before the leaves. Evergreen trees that are flowering at present include Ivory Curl tree Buckinghamia with cream flowers up to 20 cm and glossy green foliage and Stenocarpus sinuatus -Firewheel tree with rich red flowers that the bees and parrots enjoy.

A visit to your local nursery will provide a great way to discover seasonal plants.

The Animal Welfare League NSW mobile vet truck with vet and vet nurses has been a huge help to evacuees at Castle

The AWL team is providing emergency veterinary relief to companion animals and livestock and has attended to several panic-stricken horses that made their way into the showgrounds after they were rescued fleeing the floods.

They have also been assisting with general husbandry and feeding schedules to keep the animals healthy, with staff helping supply food, fresh drinking water, bedding, and towels to animals in need.

The Mobile Vet Truck (MVT) along with AWL NSW volunteers and staff were deployed to Castle Hill Showground at the request of the state government's Department of Primary Industries (DPI).

AWL NSW CEO Mark Slater said: "It is encouraging and uplifting to see the community come together to help each other in need. We are closely monitoring the situation and will continue to assist in relief efforts across the region."

Hills Shire Mayor Michelle Byrne visited the Castle Hill Showground and thanked Animal Welfare League NSW and for the "incredible work" they are doing to ensure the pets of people who have had to be evacuated are safe and well.

"It's great that council is able to offer the Showground as a facility that can be used in times of need, as our way of helping out," she said.

Australia's first, fully-fitted out B-Double vet trailer was designed to enable AWL NSW to travel to regional areas in NSW to provide desexing, vaccination and microchipping programs to communities doing it tough.



It features specially-designed areas to conduct minor animal surgeries (such as desexing) as well as an isolation room and over 35 recovery cages and is funded by community donations. To donate visit www.awlnsw.com.au/floods.

Hawkesbury Companion Animal Shelter at Mulgrave is closed to the

public after the shelter lost power. The animals have been evacuated and have been relocated to Blacktown Animal Holding Facility and an animal shelter in the Cumberland City LGA. A Hawkesbury Council spokesman said: "Rest assured our animals are safe and are being well looked after by our staff."

BLADDER STONES

Both humans and animals can get bladder stones, and if you've ever experienced bladder stones, you'll know how painful they can be.

Goji the dog (pictured) recently presented to Sydney Animal Hospitals after his owners noticed that he was straining to urinate, as well as trying to urinate frequently and the urine he was passing was tinged with blood.

During his physical examination it was suspected that Goji was suffering from bladder stones, which was then confirmed with an x-ray.

Depending on their size and amount, surgery is often indicated to remove bladder stones and Goji had surgery to remove his.

Bladder stones are mineral deposits or crystals that accumulate over weeks or months as a result of disease, inflammation in the urinary system or sometimes diet – resulting in elevated levels of stone-forming crystalline compounds in the urine. It's a condition which can affect both dogs and cats.

Dogs or cats with bladder stones often display blood in their urine or have difficulty urinating – straining, and often only passing small amounts of blood tinged urine.

Bladder stones can also sometimes cause an obstruction – this is mainly in male dogs and cats, where the stones or crystals have to travel out the narrow urethra when the animal urinates. A blocked bladder is a potentially life threatening condition and requires urgent veterinary intervention.

In addition to considering surgery, management of bladder stones involves treatment with pain relief and antibiotic medications. A urine test can be performed to determine the type of crystals which are present in the bladder, as different types often require slightly different management. Vets may also often recommend a special type of diet which can help to prevent the crystals from forming in the bladder.

SNIFFSPACE:

A NEW ERA FOR DOGS

Tracey Horey is passionate about rescue dogs and animal welfare in general and is also a successful digital consultant with three businesses, her newest venture combines her skillset with her passion and is centred around canine well-being.

Sniffspace.com.au is a new platform that she and business partner Jignesh Patel have built to connect people happy to rent out their gardens, yards or property on an hourly basis to a dog owner keen for a safe and secure, private space to bond with their dog.

Rafferty, Tracey's Kelpie x rescue dog, is the inspiration behind the concept for private off-leash space which has been two years in the planning stages.

Tracey says Rafferty is anxious with strangers and big dogs so dog parks are not a positive environment for him, but he still needs to get out and explore.

"Australia has over 5 million dogs and, statistically around 40 per cent of them present with some kind of fear or phobia making it a stressful experience for them walking along a busy street, or playing in a populated park," she said.

"With the influx of adoptions during COVID, blocks getting smaller and the trend of having a dog in apartments, more and more dogs may have poor social skills and the ability to socialise them from a young age has been greatly reduced.

"There has never been a greater need in our community to provide spaces for dogs to run free, on their own, with their owner. Without excursions to these kinds of areas our dogs' mental health really suffers."

It was during a brain-storming session with her business partner that she thought about the number of people with big yards and acreage who didn't use the space all

"We thought Sniffspace would enable them to make a passive income by renting that space for an hour at a time to a dog owner that needs a secure space to bond and play with their dog or to train in a secure environment."

Since launching Sniffspace a few months ago they have 700 people already registered and hundreds of dogs waiting for spaces.

Tracey is now looking for more homeowners willing to rent their space to dog owners. Like popular house renting platforms, hosts can choose when their space is available by setting up standard



All sports have challenges recruiting young referees but the trick is to give it a go and take it from there.

Parramatta District Rugby League Referees Association president Robert Morey himself started as a teenager and says it can be a very rewarding job, provided you stay on. The association provides officials for the Hills, Seven Hills, Toongabbie, Parramatta, Greystanes, Holroyd, Fairfield, Cabramattta, Edensor Park and Mt Pritchard areas for the more than 180 games they run each weekend.

"I started to compete with my brother who had started the year before, showing him that I could do it better," Morey said.
"I was 14 and this was technically my first job, a fun way to earn some pocket money."

Morey said they need around 20 new referees each season and they may later officiate in the Harold Matthews and SG Ball rep games. "I think you will enjoy it a lot more than you may anticipate and you will definitely make some good friends," said Morey, speaking from experience. "It is also a great way to get paid to keep fit."

Newcomer Maisy Macarthur, 13, says it's important to be confident in the decisions you make and to believe in yourself.

"As a female in a male-dominated sport, I am always going to face challenges and some of these include earning people's respect, and people believing I am too young," said the Eels fan. "Give it a go and don't be scared, everyone is so friendly."

Calliope Harvey, 15, is a second year referee who was inspired by her dad. A diehard league fan, Calliope gives it 110 per cent each week but admits it can be sometimes intimidating to take charge on the pitch. "To overcome this challenge, I like to reflect on how far I've come in such a short time and remember each week is a learning experience," Calliope said.

She said the structure is good and refereeing is "a great way to make a bit of extra pocket money".

Olivia Lawne, 18, is the veteran among the girls, having been a referee for six years. She started at 13 because she could not play league with the boys anymore.

"When I first started, I struggled with confidence, but like anything new, once you do it a few times, you improve and feel more comfortable," Olivia said.

"Give it a crack, you don't know what to expect or what it will be like until you try. We give you all the training and information you need."

SWEET CHOCOLATE FOR MEN

Easter time has become a time when many chocoholics consume mountains of Chocolate eggs and assorted sweet items. Which brings to mind some of the sweet times of the past. Who amongst you remembers buying packets of "Jaffas" and rolling them down the aisles at the local picture theatre? Or when you bought a packet of "Fantales" as you unwrapped each lolly you would read stories of the movie stars of the times. Perhaps you may have bought some "Gobstoppers" on the way to school and as you had one in your mouth you would not have been able to talk to your mates. Those were the days when we as youngsters did not concern ourselves with how much junk we put in our mouths.

Another thing from those heady days of yesteryear was the bubble gum with which we would attempt to blow a bubble so large that when it burst it would spread over your cheeks and nose. Toffee apples and home-made toffees were sold at the school fetes upon which you would, if perhaps, unlucky break your teeth.

Did you ever put "Fruit Tingles" into a glass of soft drink? This was an experiment done by a few people I knew in the past. Give it stir and watch the bubbles before drinking.

Remember the confectionary brands of "White Knight" and "Choo-Choo" bars. There were numerous chocolate and lolly brands that have either disappeared or changed over time. Brands such as "Small's Club

Chocolate" which was manufactured as a square block and marketed as "Father's favourite" that has now evolved into a regular block and called "Nestle's Club" chocolate. You were also invited, if feeling friendly, to "Share a Snack". Snack was made McRobertson's and was discontinued after acquisition by Cadbury. Their advertising slogan was "Feeling friendly share a Snack, six ripe flavours in every pack", Snack being a block of chocolate with each square filled with a fruity filling. Another Australian chocolate producer which has since disappeared was "Hoadley's". This company is keenly remembered by the youth and musicians of the 1960s for the famous "Hoadley's Battle of the Bands" concerts that toured the countryside giving performers and the youth of the day exposure to the musical culture of the times. Hoadley's products included the original "Violet Crumble" and "Polly Waffle". Some of the licorice brands of yesteryear have also disappeared due to societal change. Some of the brand names used would now be considered in poor taste and racially abhorrent. An Australian chocolate product now sold world-wide is "Freddo" frog which was created by MacRobertson's and after Cadbury's acquisition of the company it was introduced to many other countries. Mastercraft was yet another Aussie company that succumbed to foreign takeover whose products of "Golden Rough" and "Mint Pattie" are now produced by Nestle.



James Stedman Henderson's operated a company at Rosebery and the factory site was named "Sweetacres". They used that name on their products which included the afore mentioned "Jaffas" and "Fantales" That too also became subject to foreign control when "Nestle" bought the business and the "Sweetacres" name disappeared into oblivion. "Allen's" which manufactured products such as "Snakes" and "Jelly Babies" and many other sweet favourites has so far retained the name "Allen's" despite also being acquired by Nestle although I fear that the "Allen's" brand will, in the near future, also be relegated to history as I have noticed a creeping of the "Nestle" brand on newer stock of what was once "Allen's" products appearing in stores.

There are still a few Australian owned chocolate and confectionary manufactures such as Darrel Lea, Haigh's Chocolates, and Robern Menz who have bought back some of the former Hoadley's brands from Nestle.





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
