


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THE GIRL FROM MUMBAI BY BEV JORDAN

Melissa Monteiro has sought a life of service since she was a young child, and at the age of 12 was volunteering with the Missionaries of Charity set up by Mother Teresa of Calcutta close to her home in

"They had a large warehouse which was home to about 300 people and I would go in and I would help feed them after school. They had nothing. That was a turning point for me," she told the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News.

Now the CEO of the Community Migrant Resource Centre (CMRC), she is launching her book The Girl from Mumbai, this month with all proceeds going to CMRC which helps migrants and refugees settle into a new life in Australia.

The Girl from Mumbai covers Melissa's journey from India to Australia and the lessons she has learned in over 30 years of service in the community sector.

She credits her father and grandfather for instilling the value of service to others in her as a very young child, which shaped

After 30 years in the Navy her father left and was program Manager at a Catholic food relief agency for many years.

It was when a very young Melissa told him that she wanted to help the poor overseas that her dad told her to look at the poverty around her in India.

She took a Bachelor in Social Work and worked in slum districts on water sanitation, immunisation, women's groups and working on finding solutions.

"My book is about the impact of all these stages in my life," she said.

"It's about working at the grass roots to bring about change and how to influence people at the top."

Melissa moved to Australia with her husband Prakash 21 years ago, when their first child was just a baby.


She started working at the Blacktown City Community Services Network before joining Parramatta Community Migrant resource Centre in 2000, at the time it employed seven people.

It now has 150 staff, contractors and partnerships with over 200 organisations. Between them, staff speak 47 languages. CMRC provides settlement services, training and business support to name a few of the programs it runs. The CMRC also runs a number of social support groups in the Hills from its office in the Hills Community Hub at Castle Towers.

The 53-year-old mother of two said she was always going to write a book. "I was going to write a book when I retired but when COVID started I thought I should write it now."

The time seemed right as CMRC celebrates 25 years of operation and all proceeds will go to that.

The book will be launched on April 22 at Norwest by Alex Hawke, Minister for Immigration and Citizenship and

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NEW SITE FOR ROUSE HILL HOSPITAL BY BEV JORDAN

A final site has been announced for the long-awaited \$300 million Rouse Hill Public Hospital and it's on Windsor Rd near the junction with Commercial Rd, Rouse Hill.

The NSW Government made the announcement just over a week ago, on March 30, ending a huge pause since the hospital's likely site was first announced in February 2019.

The old site, at 768 Windsor Rd, was in Blacktown City Council's area near Castlebrook Memorial Park. The new site, on the opposite side of the road, is in Hills Shire Council's area and is close to Rouse Hill Town Centre.

The site acquisition process for the new land is under way and construction will start in this term of Government, prior to March 2023.

In his announcement, Health Minister Brad Hazzard said: "I want to thank the local community for their patience as the experts have worked through a number of challenging obstacles to select a site which will offer the best outcome for the people of Rouse Hill and Western Sydney.

"I am thrilled to see us move to the next stage in delivering this vital health infrastructure project. The final site has better access and allows for more land use opportunities compared with the previously announced site, and allows us to better meet the future health needs of Western Sydney."

Member for Castle Hill Ray Williams said it would be a huge advantage for patients, staff and carers to have good connectivity to the Rouse Hill Town Centre and a Sydney Metro station so close.

"Good public transport and road access is essential. Not just for patients and their families but also for the thousands of staff who will get jobs at this new hospital," Mr Williams said.

"The Rouse Hill Hospital will future-proof health services in North Western Sydney for decades to come. It will be a gamechanger for the area by providing new world-class health facilities and creating thousands of local jobs."

Hills Shire Mayor Michelle Byrne called it "fantastic news for our community" and said it provided certainty that a public hospital for the region was on its way.

"With a rapidly growing population we need this new hospital sooner rather than later to alleviate the pressure on surrounding hospitals and to provide further access to medical facilities and services closer to home.

"We are looking forward to working with the NSW Government to deliver a premier health precinct in Rouse Hill," she said.

Member for Riverstone Kevin Conolly said the new hospital will be a tremendous asset for generations. "I am excited that we are still on track to get construction under way before the next election. To have a new hospital built in the right location is what our communities deserve," Mr Conolly said.

HOUSE FIRE

Six people including two children were treated after escaping a house fire in Quakers Hill on Easter Sunday.

Fire and Rescue NSW (FRNSW) received multiple Triple Zero (000) calls to a terrace alight on Lalor Road, Quakers Hill just before 11am on Sunday.

Firefighters from Schofields Fire Station experienced extremely hazardous conditions trying to gain access to the fire, with thick smoke and extreme heat coming from the upstairs rooms where the fire originated.

Six people, including two children, were treated on scene and later transferred to hospital by NSW Ambulance. Injuries ranged from smoke inhalation to superficial burns.

More than 24 firefighters worked to bring the fire under control. Neighbours from adjoining properties were evacuated during the blaze, however firefighters managed to contain the fire to the property.

FIREARM ARRESTS

A couple were among three people arrested on Thursday, April 8, as part of an ongoing investigation into the supply of illegal firearms

The State Crime Command's Drug and Firearms Squad established Strike Force Digil. Strike force detectives assisted by North West Metropolitan Region Operations Support Group (OSG) and the Public Order Riot Squad (PORS), executed three search warrants.

About 6am, investigators attended a home at Cherrybrook and arrested a 77-year-old man and a 41-year-old woman who were taken to Ryde Police Station.

Simultaneously, police attended a home in Guildford West and arrested a 43-year-old man who was taken to Fairfield Police Station.

Search warrants were executed at both properties where detectives seized several items relevant to the investigation.

About 8am, a third search warrant was executed at a business in Double Bay. Detectives were assisted by Western Australia Police (WAPOL) during the investigation into the sale of illegal firearms across Sydney.

MISSING MAN

Police are re-appealing for public assistance to help locate a man missing from Bligh Park.

Erick Christiansen, aged 59, was reported missing to officers from Hawkesbury Police Area Command on Friday March 26, after he failed to arrive at a family member's home in Bligh Park, near Windsor.

Mr Christiansen left his home on Waters Road, Ballandean – about 80km south of Warwick near the Queensland/ NSW border – on Friday March 19.

He was driving a silver Mitsubishi Magna – with QLD registration 070SUS – bound for Bligh

Park, but he failed to arrive and has not been heard from since.

Erick is described as being of Caucasian appearance, about 180cm tall, of medium build, with short, light brown hair and blue eyes. He has tattoos on his upper arms.

Police are urging anyone with information about his whereabouts to contact Hawkesbury Police or Crime Stoppers on 1800 333 000.

EASTER ROAD TOLL

Police have charged 310 people with drink driving on NSW roads during a high-visibility operation over the Easter long weekend.

Easter Operation 2021 began at 12.01am on Thursday last week (April 1) and ended at 11:59pm on Monday April 5.

Double-demerit points were in force throughout the period for speeding, seatbelt, mobile phone and motorcycle helmet offences.

Officers were also targeting other high-risk driver behaviour, including the Four Ds: drink, drug, dangerous and distracted driving.

Traffic and Highway Patrol Commander, Assistant Commissioner Karen Webb, said the despite the warning officers charged 310 people across the state with drink driving.

"Our message to road users is that police can be anywhere, anytime throughout the year; and we'll be targeting high-risk behaviour, including drink, drug, dangerous and distracted driving."

Five people died in crashes on NSW roads during the Easter Operation, two more than last year. A total of 78 people have lost their lives on NSW roads to date this year, compared to 84 the same time last year.

SMOKE ALARM WARNING

Residents are being urged to ensure that they use their garage for the purpose it was intended and have working smoke alarms following a blaze in Quakers Hill.

Fire and Rescue NSW (FRNSW) crews were called to initial reports of a person trapped in a garage that was on fire on Narcissus Ace, Quakers Hill just before midnight on March 26.

Under the protection of hose lines, firefighters safely removed five 9kg LPG cylinders. Shortly after, the fire was contained to the garage and eventually extinguished.

A search confirmed that no one was inside the destroyed garage, and all occupants were accounted for.

Station Officer Scott Haywood of Blacktown Fire Station said it appeared residents had been cooking in the garage.

He said residents were alerted to the fire when they heard a loud band and when outside to find the garage on fire.

"This is a timely reminder, coming into winter, to have a working smoke detector in your house...make sure that what you do in your garage is fit for purpose."

For elderly Lower MacDonald residents, Alan Hunt, 86, and Janice Hunt, 79, seeing members of the Australian Defence Force assist with removing flood debris was not only a great relief but a point of personal pride with their son, a current serving Army reservist.

Among many residents in the area evacuated by boat by the NSW State Emergency Service during extensive flooding after losing power and water, the Hunts said they were thankful for the depth of community support and assistance provided during the flooding.

Having lived in Lower MacDonald for more than 21 years, they recalled that while flooding had previously affected the area, this was by far worse than anything they had experienced before.

Mr Hunt, a co-founder at the local 'Men's Shed' community group assisting correctional rehabilitation





groups and other elderly members of the community said it was a team effort.

"People that you'd never normally meet from the area before were all banding together, helping one and other after the flood offering anything they could to help," Mr Hunt said.

Speaking to the support received by State emergency agencies, Mrs Hunt said it was a relief to see them around.

"You felt reassured seeing the SES going past with their boats and helicopters knowing they were there if you needed them," she said.

In the weeks following the flooding, personnel from Operation NSW Flood

Assist were able to assist the Hunts by removing heavy and water-logged flood debris from flooded garages and sheds, moving it to be able to be removed by local council contractors.

"It's been a great relief especially with the heavy lifting, knowing there is light at the end of the tunnel. It has given us hope to say maybe we can do this and get through it," Mr Hunt said.

Particularly proud to have the ADF assist them, Mr and Mrs Hunt's son Corporal Chris Hunt is a serving Army reservist with the 1st / 15th Royal New South Wales Lancers.



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

CRITICAL ROAD UPGRADES NEEDED

A plan to place an extra levy on developers to pay for vitally needed infrastructure in Norwest will be going on public exhibition.

Hills Shire Council has calculated that approximately \$56.6 million worth of infrastructure, including road widening projects, new parks, cycleways and pedestrian links will be needed to support the future development of the Norwest Innovation Precinct.

By 2036, the broader Norwest Business Park is expected to accommodate approximately 23,900 additional jobs. There is \$2 billion worth of development within the Precinct, which includes land along Lexington Drive, Elizabeth Macarthur Drive and Norbrik Drive in Norwest.

The top 10 list of of infrastructure needs are:

- Upgrade and widening of Lexington Drive;
- Upgrade and widening of Elizabeth Macarthur Drive;
- Installation of traffic signals at Lexington Drive and Norwest Boulevard;
- Intersection expansion works at Lexington Drive, Irvine Place and Woolworths Way;
- Intersection expansion works at Lexington Drive and Meridian Place;
- Pedestrian bridge over Norwest Boulevarde;
- Upgrade of left-turn lane from Old Windsor Road onto Norbrik Drive;

- Upgrade of right-turn lane from Elizabeth Macarthur Drive onto Norbrik Drive;
- Embellishment of a new urban plaza within Circa Commercial Precinct;
- A new local park and through-site link connecting Norbrik Drive to Bella Vista Farm;

Also on the list are:

- Cycleway and pedestrian connectivity improvements throughout the precinct; and
- Provision of 40 "smart poles" throughout the precinct featuring WIFI, CCTV, power outlets and signage.

Mayor of The Hills Shire, Dr Michelle Byrne said this was a step in appropriately planning for the future.

"The planning outcomes make no sense if there isn't a corresponding increase in the infrastructure that allows roads, open space and stormwater networks to function properly. That's why this Council is planning for the future - to ensure that we understand the growth that is coming and what is needed to support this growth," Mayor Byrne said.

"Norwest Business Park is expected to remain a destination of choice for employers to base their business. The COVID-19 Pandemic has shown us the resilience of our specialised centres and I encourage more businesses to base themselves in Norwest.

"The Park is a highly connected one-stop shop to foster education, boost innovation and drive employment, and we have a great local talent pool," Mayor Byrne added.

Council is currently exhibiting a new contribution plan that focuses on the Innovation Sub-precinct of Norwest, called the Draft 7.12 Contributions Plan - Norwest Innovation Precinct. This new contributions plan will enable Council to levy monetary contributions from development within the Norwest Innovation Precinct to fund the projects listed above.

* The Norwest Innovation Precinct is one of three Precincts located in the Norwest Strategic Centre. The other two Precincts include Norwest Service (which covers the Castle Hill Employment Area along Victoria Avenue) and Norwest Central (which covers land around Norwest Station). These other Precincts will be subject to further precinct master planning to guide future changes to planning controls, and establish a plan for the delivery of additional jobs and infrastructure upgrades.

They come together as a



community, protect themselves and do a great job of doing that. We're very fortunate to have these amazing people across our community.

For this one-in-50-year flood, the cost is not known, the difficulties are not over and the challenges are going to continue. We're going to be right there to make sure, as a community, that we get through this together.

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MINTON THE MARVELLOUS

By **LAWRENCE MACHADO** Terence Minton's exploits for his beloved Baulkham Hills FC is the stuff of legends and truly inspirational because he is officially Australia's oldest registered footballer at a mere 78 years.

The oldest tag stunned the English-born Minton, who plays in the over-45s team. It is a massive credit to his remarkable fitness and commitment, which sees him mow and mark all five fields at Ted Sherwood Reserve each week, with fellow club stalwart Peter McLoughlin.

"It came as a complete surprise to know I am the oldest registered footballer in Australia," Minton said. "I thank my wife Lorraine, the people in this wonderful club and my excellent physios at Beecroft for keeping me going.

"I love the game and I will continue to play as long as they accommodate me and I can run on the field.

"When you are experienced, the big thing is knowing which point to play on the field. I prefer the outfield, either left half or inside forward. I love the camaraderie in the club and the people are beautiful.

"I keep fit by walking daily with Lorraine and I also go to the gym."

Minton played for a north London club before emigrating to Australia in 1969. He turned out for Carlingford in the Churches League before he and his wife Lorraine moved to Baulkham Hills in 1986. He started playing for BHFC over-35s in 1997, aged 54

Incidentally, one of his team-mates Keith Pierce is the second oldest player in the club at 67. Must be something in the water in Baulkham Hills!

"I got involved with the club when my son, Christopher, began playing and I later began coaching his teams," Minton said.

Minton took out the Senior Player of the Year in 2014 and has won all possible awards at the club. The charming grandfather has been a part of two titles and one premiership.

Minton has worn many hats in the committee and under his presidency, the club achieved the first of three successive premierships in the mid-2000s.

"The first title ranks among my fondest moments at the club." Minton said.

Lorraine is very proud of his passion. "I used to think he was a bit mad but this had done him a bit of good," she smiled. "So far, he has had only one injury while playing, when he broke his right arm."

If Minton has any regrets, it is that he and his son were unable to play in the same side. He rates Christopher, who now lives in England, a better player than him.

The Mintons, who have been married for 49 years, also have a daughter, Kylie.

Baulkham Hills FC president Tony Hughes said Minton is the ultimate club bloke. "Terence will do anything for the club, he has served in various roles, he even picks up the rubbish after the games," Hughes said. "He is one of those people the club cannot do without. He is very entrenched in the club and we are very proud of him."

SENIOR PETS

Dogs are considered seniors when they reach their 7th birthday, for cats it is their 10th birthday.

Just like humans, animals need greater care in their senior years as older age presents new health problems for our pets and it is important to be aware of the signs of aging as early detection is vital.

Some symptoms of aging may be obvious, like an intolerance to exercise or limited mobility. while others are much more subtle. It is important to monitor your pet's eating patterns and body weight, as obesity can cause many health issues, including osteoarthritis and diabetes in old age.

Similarly, if your pet is too thin it could be having dental issues, metabolic disease or certain types of cancers.

Sleeping patterns and cognitive behaviour are also things to look out for; a cat or dog that isn't aware of its surroundings or has difficulty recognizing people may be experiencing early cognitive dysfunction or dementia.

Also, looking at the condition of your pet's coat and how much your cat is grooming itself can also be indicative of its health.

The signs of old age can be more difficult to detect in cats than dogs due to their sedentary lifestyle.

A less obvious but just as important sign of aging is how much your pet is drinking and urinating. How much your pet is or isn't drinking can be indicative of many problems, from endocrine issues to kidney disease. Kidney disease is very common in older cats. Water intake is often difficult to check, especially in multi pet households, but water intake should be monitored closely if possible. The normal water intake for cats and dogs is approximately 50ml per kg body weight per 24hrs, any level above this warrants a check-up.

Because our pets can't talk to us and communicate how they feel, senior pets should have a routine blood test every year. This helps to determine the health of many important internal organs such as the kidneys and liver and can often be the first indicator that something is wrona.

GRANTS FOR HAWKESBURY FARMERS

In addition to a number of other vital financial supports, grants of up to \$75,000 are now open for eligible primary producers recovering from flood and storm damage under the Special Disaster Grants program.

Funded by the Australian Government and NSW Government, eligible farmers and primary producers are encouraged to speak to the NSW Rural Assistance Authority (RAA) and apply for funding.

Liberal Senator for Western Sydney, Marise Payne, said the grants have been activated as part of the Australian Government's response to the recent flooding and storms.

"The first stage of recovery is the difficult task of cleaning up," Senator Payne said.

"These grants are specifically designed to support our local farmers and primary producers through what can be a complex and understandably emotional process."

Federal Minister for Emergency Management, David Littleproud MP, visited the Hawkesbury area on March 31 and met with local turf and vegetable farmers.

Eligible primary producers are those who earn at least half of their income from onfarm sources and who will incur clean up and reinstatement costs because of storms and floods that started on 10 March 2021.

- hiring or leasing equipment or materials to clean premises, property or equipment
- removing and disposing of debris, damaged goods, materials including injured or dead livestock
- · repairing or replacing fencing and/or other essential property infrastructure
- purchasing and transporting fodder or feed for livestock
- replacing livestock
- replacing lost or damaged plants, salvaging crops, repairing or restoring fields
- repairing, reconditioning or replacing essential plant or equipment
- maintaining the health of livestock
- paying additional wages to an employee to assist with clean-up work (above and beyond normal wage expenditure, such as day-to-day staffing)
- repairing buildings (except dwellings, unless they are used for staff accommodation)

In addition to the clean-up grants, primary producers and small businesses affected by the March 2021 storms and floods who are in need of urgent assistance may be eligible for low interest loans of up to \$130,000 over a period of 10 years.

visit, he also met with Mayor Pat Conolly, representatives from the Hawkesbury Sports Council including President David Bertenshaw, Les Sheather and Councillor Sarah Richards, and Anne Neal at Benson's Lane.

"My office and I have personally reached out to the tireless Anne Neal as well as the numerous local sports clubs who have been impacted by the flooding and storms to assure they will be supported during the recovery process," Senator Payne said. "A range of supports are available through both the Rural Assistance Authority and the NSW Treasury.

Free confidential assistance is also available from the Rural Financial Counselling Service who can help with the filling out of application forms.

Age-related hearing loss, also referred to as Presbycusis, is a hearing loss that is cause by degeneration of the hearing organ over time. This degeneration can be caused by noise, toxic drugs, and diseases or medical conditions over the lifespan. Also, presbycusis is one of the four leading chronic health conditions experienced by the senior population.

This hearing loss typically affects both ears equally and it progresses

from the high pitches of sound to low pitches of sound with ageing. Presbycusis most commonly impacts on high pitches of speech sounds which greatly impairs an individual's ability to discriminate speech. This degradation in the ability to understand speech becomes even more challenging in noisy and reverberant environments like cafes and restaurants. Tinnitus has also been associated with this hearing loss. This is because as hearing sensitivity decreases, the perception of a ringing or buzzing noise can become more noticeable to the individual. Therefore the tinnitus is perceived as louder as

sounds around the individual are perceived as softer or more muffled.

Although age-related hearing loss is not a life-threatening condition, it can still have a significant impact on an individual's quality of life if it is left unmanaged and untreated. Presbycusis can cause people to withdraw from social situations or limit interactions with family and friends without even noticing that it has to do with the hearing. This can lead to loneliness, isolation or depression as the individual stops communicating with people around them.

Scientists do not currently know how to prevent agerelated hearing loss. Although, noise is a major contributor to hearing loss. This means that if you protect your ears from sounds that are too loud and last too long, you can help to prevent a hearing loss from developing.

It is important to remember that hearing cannot be restored once it is lost. So be aware of potential sources of damaging noise such as firearms, loud music, and power tools. Ensure that you are wearing earplugs or earmuffs if you are exposed to these sounds. Age related hearing loss happens slowly over time and often people are not aware of the change at first. It is important to have regular hearing assessments to understand if your hearing is slowly deteriorating over time.

"The Bulls teams are picked after our 10-week competition but if we had more oval spaces, we could run winter and summer competitions which will give us more experience."




Oztag is a hybrid game combining skills from rugby league, rugby union and touch football without the contact. The Bulls representatives also include those with soccer and AFL backgrounds.

retailers began. This led me to consider writing about one of the major retailers in this country with which I had a past association. Most of us are aware that the concept of five and ten stores began in the US. Here in Australia, we called them variety stores and the business was dominated by two groups (Coles and Woolworths). The first retailer in Australia was Mary Reibey who was an orphan, convict and widowed mother of seven children. Mary had extensive property holdings in early Sydney. She opened her shop in Sydney in 1792. The first chain store, I believe was the Atlantic & Pacific (A & P) chain in the US established in 1859. It was not until 1914 that G. J. Coles opened their store in Melbourne and ten years later, in early December 1924 Woolworths opened their first store at the Imperial Arcade on the corner of Pitt & Castlereagh Sts. Many of our readers, particularly those from the UK or North America, may be interested to know that Woolworths in Australia and New Zealand had no relationship or connection to the world famous F. W. Woolworth Company's international chain of variety stores. In fact, the consortium of five businessmen considered a number of names for the new store that they had proposed to establish in the Imperial Arcade. One name being considered was Wallworths Bazaar but during a reported meeting between two of the founding five consortium, Ernie Williams and Percy Christmas, Williams cheekily suggested that they call the new store "Woolworths" after the success of the FW Woolworth Co in the US & UK, Percy Christmas said "You wouldn't be game to use that name", to which Williams replied "Yes, I would - put on your hat and we'll go up to the Registrar's Office". This account was disputed by another of the founding five, Stanley Chatterton who claimed that he suggested the name

"Woolworths" after discovering that it was unregistered in Australia and after writing to the F.W. Woolworth company, who replied that they had no plans to operate in Australia and New Zealand.

The original prospectus read that the company proposed to retail Glassware, Crockery, Household Ironmongery, Soft goods, Fancy goods and Groceries. Hall & Humble owners of Adelaide's Cash & Carry upon which the new Woolworths store was to be based, commented that "Everything seems to be in order with the exception that we advise you to leave Groceries alone". Over the years "Groceries" are now the dominant business of Woolworths in Australia and New Zealand. Although Woolworths sold a very small range of foodstuffs in its variety stores it was in 1957 that they started to move more into groceries opening their first combined variety and grocery store at Mona Vale. This was in response to a rumour that Eddie Coles was driving to Brisbane to consider buying the Brisbane Cash & Carry (BCC) chain of 32 stores which prompted Woolworths boss, Percy Christmas to send Owen Price by plane to Brisbane to arrange the purchase of the chain. This was the start of the grocery war that saw both Coles and Woolworths start buying up local grocery chains around the nation. The grocery chains became the foundation of both companies supermarket empires of today. The names of Buttle's, Sydney Cash & Carry, Shoey's, Rodney's, Roelf Voss, McIlrath's, Dicksons, Goodways and Goodlands as well as many others have disappeared as these chains have been absorbed by the two retailing giants of the Australian grocery scene. Other chains such as Moran & Cato, Permewans, G & G, Derrin Bros., Warman's, Franklins etc have fallen by the wayside unable to compete with the majors who have since been joined by the multi-national German based Aldi.

The scope of works completed at Castle Cemetery included:


- Construction of a contemporary memorial garden facility incorporating new columbarium walls;

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
