

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Unrelenting Floods

The local Hawkesbury River communities once again faced unrelenting flooding and damage to their properties and businesses in what's been described as the worst floods to hit the area for 30 years.

With now the third flood in two years, many in the community had barely finished their clean-up from earlier in the year before being inundated once again.

The NSW Government declared the flooding and extreme weather a natural disaster, meaning flood-affected communities could access government support.

However, repair works to the roads and the riverbanks – some still unrepaired from earlier floods – would take months, particularly with the Bureau of Meteorology forecasting heavy rains in the coming months.

Hundreds of volunteers, State Emergency Services, Rural Fire Service, Police and other emergency teams have been consistently battling the aftermath in an attempt to facilitate a faster recovery.

The Wisemans Ferry Bowling Club and the Men's Shed were again hit hard. Federal Member for Berowra Julian Leeser, who visited the communities, said the damage to parts of Lower Portland and Sackville North was confronting.

The Hills SES Unit alone had completed more than 500 requests for assistance in the space of just over a week. Most of the incidents were for leaking and damaged roofs, fallen trees, flooding threatening houses, and requests for sandbags.

Pop-up sand collection points were set up at the Glenorie RFS and Box Hill Nelson RFS. Flood boat crews assisted with resupplying urgent items for residents and communities isolated by floodwaters and assisting with several flood rescues.

Disaster Recovery Centres were set up at Wisemans Ferry and South Windsor.

Hills Shire Councillor Mitchell Blue said he had met with locals from Pages Wharf Rd and Mud Island Rd at Sackville North who were still without electricity. "They are struggling for feed for their cattle and they again stressed the importance of access to their properties - something that is not lost on me. In many areas along the river, these roads provide the only access to residents and it is critical that they are repaired as soon as practicable possible" Councillor Blue said.

"These communities can't be forgotten – I have never seen so much sand washed up onto the river banks and also have never seen so much damage to our roads."

Federal and State funding is available for those affected by the floods through the Disaster Recovery Payment and Disaster Recovery Allowance. Small businesses and not-for-profit (NFP) organisations affected can apply for up to \$50,000 in support through Service NSW.

For Julian Leeser, "local residents have faced the clean-up challenge with unwavering resilience. Our community has much to be proud of. So many have stepped up to support each other and help keep the community safe in the face of disasters."

In the meantime, for some residents, the clean-up and repair work will continue for the unforeseeable future.

Dural Health Hub by ANNETTE MADJARIAN

Hornsby Shire Council has come under fire for rejecting a new "Health Hub" at Round Corner Dural which would meet "the needs of a growing and ageing population".

Healing ONR proposed the development of a two storey 4,100m health services facility described as bringing "a strong mix of much needed hospital grade services into the heart of this thriving community".

The concept includes 19 specialist consulting rooms, a 16-room medical centre, day surgery with four operating rooms, 20 recovery bays and 15 short stay beds, pathology collection area, medical imaging centre as well as two basement carparking levels and an ambulance bay.

Hornsby Shire Councillors unanimously voted against the development at the 13th July Council meeting, citing a slew of inconsistencies, including the proposal being incompatible with the rural zone setting and impacts to traffic in the area.

COUNCIL'S REJECTION WAS DUE TO:

- Inconsistency with the Greater Sydney Regional Plan and the North District Plan.
- Inconsistency with Section 9.1 Ministerial Directions.
- Inconsistency with the Hornsby Local Strategic Planning Statement.
- Inconsistency with the Hornsby Employment Lands Study.
- Inconsistency with the Rural Lands Study. The proposed land use is incompatible with the rural zone setting.

 There are potential amenity impacts with the built form on adjoining properties. There are potential traffic impacts on the surrounding road network.

Healing ONR said it was now requesting an Additional Permitted

Use (APU) via a planning proposal request. This would allow them to "obtain a development application approval for the development of the Dural Health Hub facility within the current RU2 Rural Landscape and SP2 Infrastructure zoning, rather than asking for the site to be rezoned to a non comparable business use".

Healing ONR said "this very specific use provision" means they would not set a "planning precedence and there is minimal risk of the proposal opening the floodgates for other, less harmonious types of development".

Liminal Property Solutions Director Andrew Bell, representing Healing ONR, said Council "did not consider the continued need for quality health services from residents and the challenges faced by many".

He said ageing residents in the Dural community should not be forced to travel as far as 80 minutes to access hospital grade health services.

He said they had been working with Council for more than two years and had received the backing of local community, businesses and adjoining landowners.

"This decision would be more understandable if there was significant community pushback, but the fact is there has been almost unanimous support. What alternative plans does Council have for meeting this existing and rising demand for accessible health services for our ageing population in Dural?" he said.

Hornsby Councillor Warren Waddell said that although adjoining and nearby businesses, including Thompson Health, had their DAs approved under rural zoning, this Health Hub "did not seek to occupy the entire remaining infill area, so it would be a requirement to rezone the entire strip in order to avoid another ad hoc development".

He said the design was not "sympathetic" to the site, and there needed to be "less bulk and scale and increased connectivity to the surrounding amenity".

However, Councillor Waddell said he would support the rezoning of the adjacent Round Corner Village precinct to ensure a "proper marriage of the existing developments and those proposed".

TEENS CHARGED WITH ATTACK ON MAYOR

Four teenagers were charged by police this week following two aggravated home invasions in May this year including one at the home of Hawkesbury Mayor Patrick Conolly. Hawkesbury police attended the Bligh Park home of Clr Conolly on

12.45am on Monday 16th May after reports that several men had forced entry to the home and threatened the 32-year-old Mayor before he was stabbed to the upper arm and treated at Westmead Hospital.

His wife and four children were at home at the time of the incident but were uninjured. The group fled the scene in a vehicle.

Some hours before the Bligh Park incident, a group forced entry to a home on Captain Cook Drive, Willmot and allegedly assaulted two occupants, a 30-year-old woman and a 42-yearold man, before stealing personal items from the home. A teenage girl was at the home at the time but was uninjured.

Officers attached to Hawkesbury Police Area Command commenced an investigation into both incidents, prior to detectives from the State Crime Command's Robbery and Serious Crime Squad taking carriage under Strike Force Dites.

Following extensive inquiries, strike force investigators – with assistance of Raptor Squad officers – executed a search warrant at a home in Macquarie Fields on Tuesday 19th July.

A 16-year-old boy was subsequently arrested and charged with robbery in company while armed with dangerous weapon, specially aggravated break and enter and commit serious indictable offence-wound, steal motor vehicle, drive conveyance taken without consent, be carried in conveyance taken without consent, never licenced person drive vehicle on road and participate in criminal group.

Three other teenage males, two aged 17 and one aged 18, were arrested at St Marys Police Station.

The 18-year-old was charged with eight offences including be carried in conveyance taken without consent of owner, in company rob while armed with dangerous weapon, special aggravated break and enter commit serious indictable offence, steal motor vehicle, drive conveyance taken without consent of owner, never licensed person drive vehicle on road and participate criminal group contribute criminal activity.

One of the 17-year-old's was charged with robbery in company while armed with dangerous weapon, specially aggravated break and enter and commit serious indictable offence-wound, possess unauthorised pistol, steal motor vehicle, drive conveyance taken without consent, be caried in conveyance taken without consent and participate in criminal group.

The second 17-year-old was charged with robbery in company while armed with dangerous weapon, specially aggravated break and enter and commit serious indictable offence-wound, steal motor vehicle, be caried in conveyance taken without consent (x2) and participate in criminal group. Investigations under Strike Force Dites are ongoing.

PLEA AFTER SHOOTING

Raptor Squad officers are appealing for public assistance to identify a distinctive Ford Mustang, as they continue their investigations into the shooting of an OMCG member on Tuesday 26th July.

A 31-year-old man presented to Hawkesbury Hospital at 9.30am with non life-threatening gun-shot wounds after driving himself there.

Officers from Hawkesbury Police Area Command were notified and spoke with the man – who is a known Rebels OMCG member.

A short time later, a crime scene was established outside a premises in Bounty Crescent, Bligh Park.

A second crime scene was also declared on Bonnor Road, following the discovery of a burntout vehicle, which has now been identified as a bright red/orange Ford Mustang. Both vehicles have been seized for forensic examination.

Officers from State Crime Command's Raptor Squad are investigating the circumstances surrounding how the man came to be shot and are appealing for information.

In particular, detectives believe someone may have seen the distinctive red/orange Ford Mustang in the Bligh Park or Agnes Banks areas around the time of the incident.

Anyone with dashcam footage in those areas on Tuesday morning who may have recorded footage of a vehicle matching the description are urged to contact Raptor Squad officers via Crime Stoppers.

STOLEN GOODS FOUND

An Aladdin's cave of alleged stolen property has been uncovered by Hills Proactive Police Team.

Hills Police executed a search warrant with the assistance of NWM Operational Support Group at 6.55am on 26th July at a Plumpton address.

During the search police found \$50,000-worth of clothing, and toys from Retail stores allegedly stolen from stores at Rouse Hill Town Centre and Castle Hill Towers.

A 38-year-old man was arrested.

SCAM ALERTS

Police are warning people to be aware of scam text messages (SMS) about tax refunds.

The fake messages claim to be from the ATO and ask you to open a hyperlink to fill out a form for your income tax return. The link takes you to a fake website designed to steal your personal information and credit card details.

If you receive an SMS like this, don't click on any links. Instead, report the SMS to police

GALSTON GORGE

Unprecedented ongoing rainfall this year has led to eight slippage sites along Galston Road between Hornsby Heights and Galston.

In May 2022, Transport NSW advised that Galston Road will be reclosing to complete further remediation works at slippage site 3.

These works are now scheduled to be carried out from Monday 8 August, taking up to two months to complete, weather permitting.

The work will involve stabilisation of the existing dry-stone retaining wall and is a preventative measure to reduce the chances of road closures in the future.

ConnectSydney will be utilising the closure of Galston Gorge to carry out additional routine maintenance to reduce the impact on the community.

Works have been completed on seven slippage sites which has included the removal of approximately 1,600 tonnes of rock from the slopes including some large boulders, the installation of rock bolts and application of shotcrete to stabilise rock faces, the scaling of slope surfaces and completion of drainage improvements.

Candles for Shereen By BEV JORDAN

A candlelight vigil will be held at Kenthurst Park this Sunday (July 31st) at 4.30pm to celebrate the life and mourn the death of Shereen Kumar.

The body of the 43-year-old mother-of-two was discovered in bushland in Dural, not far from her home, on Saturday (July 23rd), three days after she was reported missing.

Police and volunteers from the RFS and SES were searching a wide area and found her body just before 6pm in bushland off Laurie Road.

Shereen was remembered as a loving mother and a great friend. A Masters graduate from Western Sydney University she ran her own business HR 2U Services and was very involved with local business chambers.

She had taken over the franchise of a dog walking business late last year and loved it. She was also a successful part-time model.

She shared the care of her two children, a son aged 12 and 7-year-old daughter, with her former husband Gurpreet Beehan.

He told the Daily Mail Australia the family is "heartbroken".

Her mother Roshni and sister Nikki have said that she was a wonderful mother and daughter.

Shereen had a wide circle of friends who mobilised to publish her disappearance on social media and conduct a search for her in the Dural bushland. They spoke about a kindhearted woman with a big smile who became a sought-after model after her 40th birthday.

Friend Erika Wadlow who had been searching for her in bushland on Saturday said Shereen had been a wonderful friend to many and she was "devastated" by her loss.

"Like moths that flutter around a flame, she was our sun. Not hearing her laugh will be my greatest loss," she said. "Shereen Kumar was the strongest person I know, which means we have to work even harder at keeping women safe. She was special and one of those people who you think is always going to be in your life.

On Facebook Jess Terry said: "Rest in peace angel ... my weekly dog walks definitely won't be the same without you! The most beautiful and kind soul gone way too soon, you'll be forever missed."

Shereen arew up in Fiji: Her childhood friend from Gospel High School Roselyn Pillay posted: "A great honest soul."

Les Stock: "I am devastated ... Shereen was a beautiful person inside and out and touched many people's lives in such a positive way. The world is poorer for her loss."

Photographer Hal Saunders posted that as well as having a "phenomenal modelling ability" Shereen was "warm, friendly and a lovely person to work with" and was constantly in demand for photographic work.

"Shereen, your sweet nature deserved so much better, all your associates and friends in the modelling and photography communities are saddened by your passing," he wrote.

Asbestos Awareness

It's not always top of mind when cleaning up or making repairs after severe weather events but being aware of a hidden danger commonly lurking in damaged building materials could just save your life.

1 in 3 houses contain asbestos and if your home was built before 1990 it is likely to be in this category. Over 3000 asbestos products were commonly used in Australian homes and businesses before their use was banned in 2003.

While many of us may think about and prepare to find asbestos when renovating or getting into some home DIY, it's easy to forget about this deadly risk with the additional stress and trauma that accompanies natural disasters.

Asbestos must be managed safely to protect yourself, your family, and your local community from unnecessary exposure to asbestos fibres. Roofing, internal walls and ceilings, eaves, pipes, flooring underlay, and fencing can all contain asbestos.

The physical damage caused by floods, storms, and wind, allows previously contained asbestos fibres from broken or eroded materials to become loose and airborne as dust particles. If these are breathed in, they can lead to fatal lung disease in the form of cancers, (lung cancer or mesothelioma) or asbestosis (severe scarring of the lungs).

4000 people tragically die of asbestos-related disease each year in Australia, which is 3 times the annual road toll. Most of these people unknowingly came into contact with asbestos in their homes while doing handywork or were tradespeople not wearing correct protective equipment.

A licensed asbestos removalist knows how to safely remove and dispose of asbestos, then decontaminate your property to minimise health risks. Using a professional is the safest approach but not always possible immediately following a flood or a storm.



WHAT SHOULD YOU DO?

- 1. Contact council or emergency services for advice. They can provide valuable information and an asbestos management plan. The Hills Shire Council website is a good resource with useful links to asbestosawareness.com.au
- 2. Know what materials are likely to contain asbestos (product database) and where in your home they would be (homeowner checklist) - these can be found through links on the council's website.
- 3. If you find yourself in an emergency situation, full PPE (personal protective equipment) is best but at the bare minimum always wear heavy-duty rubber gloves, sturdy footwear, and a P2 mask.
- 4. Asbestos materials are considered safer when they are wet as the fibres are less likely to become airborne. If damaged materials are drying out, gently dampen them with a hose until they can be disposed of.
- 5. When cleaning asbestos-containing walls or roofs, do this gently by hand or with a garden hose, not a pressure hose or water blaster as these risk releasing contaminating fibres over a large area.
- 6. Never put asbestos-containing material in any council bins or skip bins (it is illegal), it must be properly disposed of at an asbestos landfill site. This is crucial to keeping your family, volunteers and clean-up crews safe.

Urgent Care Services

Three local Urgent Care Service centres have been set up by the Western Sydney Care Collective to take the strain off hospital emergency departments.

The new UCS centres are at Castle Hill Medical Centre, Rouse Hill Family Medical Practice and Our Medical Home Marsden Park.

UCS centres will allow people who live in the Western Sydney Local Government Areas to book a same-day appointment by calling the Urgent Care Line on 1800 371 372 and be seen and treated by an experienced GP. UCSs have extended practice hours and staff with emergency experience. There will be reduced waiting times and less cost associated with Emergency Departments.

Urgent Care Service centres can provide medical care for:

- Suspected fractures, sprains and dislocations
- Wound management and cuts requiring stitches
- Bites
- Burns and scolds
- Removal of foreign objects from skin, eyes and ears

They should not be used in certain cases, including for children under three months of age, people over 65 years who require an infusion, people undergoing chemotherapy or those with a primary mental health diagnosis.

If the condition is potentially serious or life-threatening, go directly to an Emergency Department.

Western Sydney Care Collective initiative is a collaboration between the Western Sydney Primary Health Network and the Western Sydney Local Health District.

Scott Walters, Senior Program Manager WentWest Limited says the aim is to provide "the right care, in the right place at the right time".

"The Western Sydney Care Collective aims to reduce the number of people who present to a Western Sydney Emergency Department for urgent treatment of a condition that isn't life-threatening by providing alternative urgent care services that are free, local and patient-centred," he said.

The day excursions are many and varied, to destinations such as the Southern Highlands; the Blue Mountains; the Central Coast and also to many other different locations in and around the Sydney metropolitan area. These day trips could include museums, art galleries, open gardens, historical sites, scenic drives, open government buildings, etc.

All of our bus trips are planned well in advance with travellers receiving an 8-week, well-detailed, plan of the proposed trips that will be undertaken during that period. The details include exactly where the bus will be going and what our travellers will see and do. Our drivers will make stops for morning tea en route and also for lunch.

Sometimes, depending on the route being taken, our morning tea stops could be in a lovely park somewhere, with facilities, or a stop at a café for our travellers to purchase a snack and a tea or a coffee if they choose. Lunch will usually be at a café or similar, at our destination for that day and will be at your own expense. Alternatively, our travellers can also take their own morning tea snacks and also lunch, if they prefer.

All of our drivers are Volunteers, very experienced, friendly and very accommodating and we travel in a Toyota Coaster bus that will accommodate 20 passengers. There is also a hostess on board to help all travellers enjoy their day and to answer any questions they may have.

Some of the excursions that are already in the planning stages for next term – July/ August/early September – are:

- "Windyridge" Garden at Mt Wilson in the Blue Mountains
- The Mint in Sydney
- Headland Park Quarantine Station, Mosman
- Grand Pacific Drive south of Sydney
- A Central Coast Scenic Drive via Wisemans Ferry and Spencer
- "Lisgar" Gardens at Hornsby

The above trips are just an example of some of the trips that we do, with different locations selected for each of the four school term periods each year. The only requirement we have for our travellers is that they be selfmanaging and do not have any mobility issues, as we are unable to assist with or accommodate wheelchairs, walking frames, etc.

We charge an upfront payment of \$160 per person for our 8-week term, which works out to be just \$20 per weekly excursion plus expenses when out and about. Unfortunately, we are unable to accept casual bookings on a week-byweek basis.

A young autistic man who has just won a business award is one of the guest speakers at the Stronger Together Conference being held at Castle Hill RSL on August 20th.

Organised by the Fit Kidz Foundation, the free one-day conference is for parents and carers of children with neuro-diversity and aims to break down the isolation that many parents of children with specialised needs feel. Randa Habelrih and her son Richard founded Autism MATES a not-for profit Facebook page that focuses on empowerment.

Richard's new business venture, Freckly Faces, makes handmade chocolates with sprinkles and has just won a Best Online Business Award.

Randa said it was an emotional moment .: "My emotion stemmed from being in awe of how far he had come from that little boy who struggled with literally everything, including speaking (he was non-verbal in his early years) even walking was a challenge."

Richard started making chocolate Freckly Faces at home during the 2021 lockdown and with his parents help began to sell them online. The online business has taken off and their aim is to employ more young people on the autism spectrum.

More than 400 aspiring early childhood teachers across NSW are set to receive a cash boost to complete their higher education studies.

Hills Winter Sleepout 2022 By BEV JORDAN

Chris Cleary knows exactly what it's like living on the streets. The founder of the StreetMed charity has spent years talking to the homeless, providing First Aid and food.

StreetMed and Hills Community Aid will both be getting funds to help the homeless and those at risk through the 2022 Hills Winter Sleepout at Bella Vista Farm on Saturday, August 13th.

Cris Cleary said: "It's been the coldest winter I can remember for so long and patrons are dying, patrons are at risk of dying, patrons are at risk of frostbite and cold related injuries. Hypothermia and exposure are a real thing for those that don't have the ability to have a roof over their heads at night.

"Every person lost, every person admitted to hospital due to exposure, every person we treat with excessive cold related injuries breaks another piece of my heart and soul. As a society we can and MUST do better! The last two years of Covid has had a significant impact on our abilities to raise funds and right now we have a call to action and make a difference to those who rely on organisations like ours StreetMed and Hills Community Aid. "

Last year's Hills Winter Sleepout raised a record breaking \$50,119. \$5000 went to StreetMed and the rest went to the Hills Homeless Prevention Initiative (HHPI) run by Hills Community Aid.

For the last four financial years (up to June 30th 2022) funds from HHPI have helped 177 adults and 107 children at the risk of being

homeless. Executive officer at Hills Community Aid Mici Beer said that applications were up by 27% in the 2021/22 financial year.

"Of those, 29% of applications were from people affected by domestic violence and 36% of applications disclosed that they have a disability," she said.

Many were facing the stress of increases in rent at a time when they were facing reduced hours or shifts or were having to time off because they or their children had COVID. The first winter sleepout was held in 2014 and had 40 participants. It has grown substantially since then. Founder Michelle Byrne said: "The Sleepout over the years has taught me how hidden homelessness can be in the Hills.

"You can easily walk past someone who is experiencing homeless and not even know it. "It is important we continue to shine a light on homelessness and its causes such as DV, severe financial crisis, relationship/family breakdowns, mental illness etc whilst ensuring that help is accessible for those who need it.

"I have also learnt a lot about the important work local charities such as Hills Community Aid and StreetMed do and have heard the incredible stories of lives turned around as a result of funds raised by the sleep out."

Joining the Hills Winter Sleepout at Bella Vista Farm on Saturday August 13th will give people a chance to hear from volunteers working with the homeless through StreetMed and the Shining Light Foundation as well as speakers from Hills Community Aid and Kenthurst Rotary which is supporting a transitional housing project for older women at risk.

There will be a sausage sizzle by Norwest Sunrise Rotary Club and tea/coffee by Hills Daily Grind.

JULIE CHARLTON Bound for Birmingham By GISELA HORNER

This week, 23rd July, Julie Charlton got on a plane to represent Australia in para-athletics in the F57 Shotput at the Birmingham Commonwealth Games.

This is a remarkable achievement for 23 year old Julie from Dural. Julie was born with Spina Bifida which is a birth defect that occurs when the spine and spinal cord don't form properly.

As a young girl, Julie was never fully included in school sport, as she was always placed on the sidelines by teachers who did not have an understanding of inclusive sport. This changed when three outstanding PE teachers throughout her life gave her access to opportunities in sport. Travelling on her own and being responsible for her wheel chair, throwing seat and two bags required for a world class event, was an extra challenge.

During Julie's early primary school education, her family moved from lower North Shore to Dural, where she lives today with her parents. Julie attended the American International School of Sydney (AISS). Jane and Andrew, Julie's parents, were impressed by the school's forward-thinking with regard to disabled students. Jonathan Butcher, the first of her life-changing PE teachers taught Julie, aged eight. He gave her great support by encouraging her to take part in the school athletics carnival, understanding her needs and this sowed the seed for her passion for athletics. The following year, the school closed and Julie was homeschooled for that year.

James Muir, her second PE teacher, at Hills Grammar School, continued that support and encouragement. Although Julie battled initially to become accepted as part of the normal school community, her tenacity enabled her to overcome problems such as access to classrooms and inclusive educational needs.

For the last ten years, retired PE teacher, Rob Blackadder, has been her mentor and friend. They met whilst Rob was officiating and organising young athletes in competition



with Athletics NSW. Rob has given her the opportunity to succeed further in para-athletics.

Apart from being chosen to represent Australia at the Commonwealth Games this year and being ranked in the top 10 in the world in seated Shotput, last month Julie won a Gold Medal at the Oceania Athletics Championships in Secured Discus in Mackay.

In 2021 Julie was named Hills Shire Youth Ambassador encouraged by former Mayor, Dr Michelle Byrne who was impressed by Julie's enthusiasm for activities for young people in the community and recommended her for this award. Michelle said:

"Julie is awesome and I love what she does to stand up for other athletes who aren't given the same treatment and respect as able-bodied athletes. She is a dynamo and will change the world."

One of the activities Julie is involved in is the Hills youth army (HYA). HYA organises high school students and young adults to do volunteer work in the community. It teaches them about social awareness, solving problems and helps to develop leadership skills.

Julie is in her 3rd year of a Bachelor of Sports Coaching and Management degree at the Australian College of Physical Education, Homebush. She is an athletics coach and runs her own business, JC2 Athletics, training five young people in para-athletic sports. Julie sets them training programs which they can continue whilst she is away.

In her 23 years, Julie has done more than most of us do in a lifetime, including a 3-month internship at ABC Sport, Ultimo, shadowing presenters in TV, radio and digital which she greatly enjoyed. She is well versed in public

speaking and expresses herself eloquently. I asked if she would like to continue in sports journalism. Julie hesitated and said:

"My philosophy, as an athlete, is to be the best I can be. It means continuing to improve my strength, my mindset and my knowledge of sport as a member of Athletics. I don't like having competitive goals, they are short term and don't let me grow philosophically. I want to advise and help grow para-athletics and future athletes to be their best.

"As disabled people, it's not our disability we have to overcome but society's attitude and its reluctance to learn about disability, which is known as Ableism".

Julie is an impressive and inspiring young woman and whatever pathway she decides to take, she will be a great ambassador not only for disability rights and inclusive education, but for the youth of today.





Our latest adventure turned out to be a science and history lesson all rolled into one. With the sun shining we decided we would visit the Galston Valley Railway to ride the miniature trains. Having never been myself, I really wasn't sure what to expect or if my daughters would even really enjoy it.

What we discovered was incredible. As soon as I saw the miniature railway, I was instantly transported back to my childhood when we had a model train set. My sisters and I would run the trains around the small track for hours, over the bridges, through the tunnels, around the mountain, past the houses and paddocks and back to the station again. In many ways the Galston Valley Railway is similar except a lot larger and a lot more fun!

Run by the Hornsby Model Engineers, the Galston Valley Railway is a 5" gauge miniature railway which is approximately 1km in length and sits in a natural bush setting. Like the train set from my childhood, there are tunnels and bridges as well as a station and a Station Masters box. The train toots its horn loudly as it pulls out of the station and if you keep your



eyes peeled, you will see garden gnomes and terracotta clay animals hidden amongst the rocks and the trees as the train works its way through the bush. There are viewing platforms as well as seating so you can watch the miniature trains as they run around the tracks. Best of all adults can also ride the trains making it entertaining for everyone.

There are two types of trains – steam and diesel. As we stood waiting for our turn to ride the miniature trains, Maddie and Alexis asked why there is smoke coming out of the train. This led to our discussion of how steam trains work and why they are no longer used. We ended up riding the trains multiple times with Maddie declaring "this is awesome".

There are viewing platforms and seating to watch the miniature trains as well as a garden gauge model railway display with model scale buildings. On site there are also picnic tables and BBQs for the public to use. You can bring your own lunch to enjoy. There is also a canteen selling tea & coffee, cold drinks, ice-creams and lollies as well as a sausage sandwich stall. Galston Valley Railway is open every 2nd Sunday in the month and is completely run by passionate volunteers who willingly share their knowledge and love of trains. All the funds they raise from ticket sales, the BBQ and the Canteen goes straight back into maintaining and improving the miniature railway and the facilities on site.

It is well worth a visit especially if you have younger children and I certainly look forward to visiting the Galston Valley Railway soon with my nieces and nephews.

During the papacy of St. Gregory the Great (590-604AD) chanting was promoted, especially in the European monasteries and this music is now referred to as Gregorian Chant. It was an aural tradition, with new monks learning from hearing the older monks. Chants were in Latin, which was by then the official language of the Christian Church. It was not until 12th Century that an early music notation was established, pre-dating the current modern musical script.

In Gregoriana Arcadia, we sing a cappella from the old music, as it has been sung for well over 1000 years. We practice on the second Saturday afternoon of the month, 2-4pm, in the beautiful chapel at the Benedictine Monastery, 121 Arcadia Road, Arcadia. Dr Pip Gibian is the current Choir Coordinator.

A new mini store has opened at The Hills School in Northmead to support students with additional needs by giving them hands-on learning experiences.

The opening of Hills Fresh Food follows successful Mini Woolies sites at The Ponds School in The Ponds and Gabe Fresh Food at St Gabriels, Castle Hill.

Mathew and Neralie Want said their 11-yearold Ethan (pictured) just loved the experience saying he was a fun-loving and very curious kid.

"We can take him to the shops and do this with him to some extent, but we can't give him the experiences for example of being able to work behind the registers or understand what it is to stock the shelves. Hopefully, it gives him an idea of where he can go after school with that," said Matthew. "Ethan is in Year six and I hope in this time he will get out of the program, some comfort of transacting in a real-world scenario - talking to someone behind a register or working with someone behind a register and build on the ability to create a habit of this is how you buy groceries and food.

"It's important to be aware of sensory input so it's great to see that he can practice this at school, where it's quiet, less distractions and fewer loud noises. "

Neralie said: "It's about Ethan being able to do what he wants in his own time too. He won't feel rushed in this environment and he hasn't

got big queues behind him. He's familiar with the school environment and now he gets to look at fruit and veg and get used to the different colours and smells in a place that is very familiar to him."

The Hills School caters for the education needs of over 110 students aged 4 -18 years with a range of additional physical, intellectual and complex needs including sensory impairments.

The mini Woolworths store mimics the operations of an actual Woolworths supermarket, with baskets for fresh food, shelving for groceries, ticketing, signage and Woolworths branded uniforms the students can wear to create an immersive educational experience. Using a fully operational Fujitsu register, students learn to scan grocery items and handle money when they process sales.

Woolworths team members from the nearby Winston Hills supermarket have been helping students stock shelves and provide register training in readiness for the opening.

Mark Gosbell, The Hills School Principal said: "Having an on-site Mini Woolworths store will provide authentic learning opportunities.

"Students will be able to develop independent living skills, functional literacy and numeracy and have an additional learning space that encourages development of communication. We are excited for what it will bring to our students and their families."

The new mini Woolworths at The Hills School is the 16th mini-supermarket of its kind.

Showtime for Hulley at the Games

Australia's four-time hammer throw champion Alex Hulley will be using her experience at the recent World Athletics Championships to nail a second Commonwealth Games medal in Birmingham next week.

The reigning Commonwealth Games silver medallist exclusively told the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News from Birmingham that her confidence has improved a lot after her World Championships debut in Oregon, USA.

The Rouse Hill local admitted she has struggled over the past two years in confidence, had some injury setbacks but is now getting back to her best.

It's showtime for Hulley, 25, in Birmingham, having had a best heave of 68.83m in Oregon after a nervous first attempt at 64m. She was incidentally, the first Australian hammer thrower in 18 years to compete at a senior

world event. Her world ranking jumped from 34 to 18 after her impressive world championship performance.

"These distances are pretty similar to what I've been throwing throughout the season so I was happy to finish such a major competition with a good result," said Hulley. "The best advice I got from my coaches was that I belong there, I earned my place and I can definitely mix it with the very best in the world."

Since she won her first junior national title and then a silver at the 2014 Youth Olympics, Hulley has been an unstoppable force in Australian hammer throwing, even nailing an incredible 70.55m at the Sydney Track Classic in 2019/20 season, to outshine four-time US champion Gwen Berry.

Asked if she can win a second Commonwealth Games medal, the sunnynatured Hulley said: "Anything can happen on the day. That's definitely the goal, to come home with a medal!

"I definitely feel confident now that I know I can throw far again. We have kept things mainly the same, working on getting stronger, more powerful, and faster in the circle. My coaches (Breanne Clement and Karyne D Marco) and I have made some really great technical improvements over the last year and we are definitely seeing those pay off now. Championships Hulley is enjoying her hectic schedule, having left Australia for the US on July 7, and has been in England for the past week in preparation for her competition which starts

with a qualifying round on Thursday, August 4. She will be cheered on by her proud parents, Matthew and Louise Hulley, and an aunt, though younger sister Georgia, a promising athlete herself, has stayed back to complete her university studies.

"After these competitions, I am staying in London to continue training and competing in Finland and hopefully Hungary," Hulley said. "I will also have a little holiday with dad in Italy after all the competitions are done before heading home."

Kellyville sports complex a boon to the Hills By LAWRENCE MACHADO

As many as five clubs from three different sports will benefit from the new multi-purpose fields at the Balmoral Road Reserve, Kellyville, with tennis also receiving a timely boost.

Hills Football Association, Kellyville/Rouse Hill Junior Football Club, Baulkham Hills Hawks Junior AFL Club, Hawkesbury Cricket Club, and Kellyville Supersonics Cricket Club will share the four fields for training and matches during summer and winter.

In addition, there are four tennis courts and two multi-purpose ball courts at the reserve. Residents can use the tennis courts via a booking system with no coaching groups or commercial organisations able to access it for now, according to The Hills Shire Council.

The Hills To Hawkesbury Community News had reported on this impressive sporting facility before it was officially opened by NSW Minister for Planning Anthony Roberts and The Hills Shire Mayor Dr Peter Gangemi on July 22, in the presence of residents and club representatives.

The minister said it was wonderful to see the reserve become a reality, thanks to a funding boost from the NSW Government's Accelerated Infrastructure Fund.

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"Providing high-quality outdoor spaces is a priority for the NSW Government and Balmoral Road Reserve is great example of what can be achieved when we work in collaboration with councils to create assets that communities really want and need," Mr Roberts said.

Mayor Gangemi said the new sporting facility "has been hotly anticipated by the Hills community and we are very excited to deliver it for them".

"It will provide a place where our residents and sporting clubs can play and train, and families and friends can socialise and exercise. More importantly, it's a place where our residents and visitors will find enjoyment and have a whole lot of fun" he said.

He said the extra funding boost has

enabled the council to deliver the sporting complex ahead of schedule and provided hundreds of jobs during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The reserve has three buildings for the different fields, a club room, a referees/umpires room, and toilets. The council has also built a 245-space car park and a kiosk.

The sporting and leisure complex also provides cyclists and pedestrians an illuminated shared path with a link to the bigger Greenway cycle link, between Bella Vista Farm and Rouse Hill Town Centre.

BRANDON STARC: Defends his long jump title

The Hills Shire has always been producing exceptional sportsmen and women who have done the country proud at world events.

Our contribution to the 400-strong Australian contingent for the 2022 Commonwealth Games in Birmingham continues that rich vein. Some of the representatives include Baulkham Hills-born high jump champion Brandon Starc, Dural 100m hurdles sensation Michelle Jenneke, and Rouse Hill hammer throwing ace Alex Hulley (featured on another page).

Starc, 28, will be defending his high gold medal at the Commonwealth Games. The reigning Australian champion will be the man to beat in Birmingham, having soared 2.32m to win the gold in front of delighted home fans at the 2018 Gold Coast Games. This was a huge improvement from his eighth place at the 2014 Games in Glasgow.

Starc, the younger brother of Australian fast bowling great Mitchell, is attached to Parramatta City Track and Field. He began his career at Parramatta Little Athletics while attending Lidcome Public School. He later attended the Hills Sports High School, playing cricket and football before settling for the high jump.



Starc finished 15th in Rio de Janeiro Olympic Games before his massive improvement in the 2020 Olympics in Tokyo, where he was fifth. He was very unlucky in Tokyo despite clearing 2.35m, which would have guaranteed him a medal at any other Olympics.

Starc recently toured local LA clubs to speak to the youngsters and inspire the next generation of champions.

She qualified for the semifinals there in a blistering time of 12.66 seconds, becoming the second fastest Australian woman. However, she finished 11th overall in a star-studded field. The Dural ace is one of the many outstanding alumni from Cherrybrook Little Athletics who has made it to the world stage. She will be keen to improve on her fourth place at the 2018 Gold Coast Games. She has genuine pace and the smooth action to go all the way this time, having come close to snatching a medal at the previous Games

Jenneke, a classy all-round sportswoman, is internationally famous for her warm-up dance which has gone viral around the world. One version of the video of her pre-race warm-up notched an incredible 30 million views on YouTube.

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MEMORIES WITH IVOR JONES & FRIENDS

Alpacas, Quinine & A Titanic Burial

On a recent visit to Rookwood Cemetery, I spoke to Mark Bundy, General Manager Operations. I had met Mark previously when he had given a talk at a recent Parramatta Probus Club meeting and I recognised him whilst attending a Hills Friendship Club outing at Rookwood, more recently.

I asked Mark if he could provide me with some interesting anecdotes for use in this publication which he kindly offered to do. To use Mark's words "he would be the last person to let anyone down", being a grave digger or as he is now known as a "Burial Technician".

Mark has now provided me with some very interesting information regarding two people, amongst the millions buried at Rookwood, leading me to conduct a little further research into the two.

Now we have all heard of the health benefits of quinine but did you know of its links to Australia? Charles Ledger who died in 1905 at Leichhardt was responsible for the discovery of quinine and, through his efforts, it became a world-wide effective health remedy. Charles was a character who took chances. Born in 1818 at Bucklesbury, London he travelled to Peru where he gained employment as a clerk in a British Merchants Office in Lima. Whilst out one day,

he rescued a drowning native, Manuel Incra Manami. As thanks Manuel offered his services to become his servant and, in 1865, started to obtain seeds of the cinchona trees for Charles. The export of these seeds was forbidden by the countries of South America, but Charles had secretly sent seeds to his brother in London. The Dutch government purchased some of the seeds, whilst others had been sent to India and Queensland. Whilst those planted in Queensland did not fare well, those planted in India and in the Dutch East Indies were grown successfully and spread rapidly. The bark on the Cinchona is where quinine is produced. As well as the medicinal properties, it is also used as a flavour component of tonic water and bitter lemon drink mixers and a popular mixer with gin creating the gin and tonic cocktail.

Charles Ledger's servant Manuel was arrested whilst on a seed hunting trip in 1871 and beaten so badly that he died shortly afterwards. Charles then ceased to collect any more seeds however he provided money to Manuel's family.

Charles Ledger was also responsible for the importation of Alpacas into Australia in 1859 when he brought several hundred of the animals to Sydney. How he managed to export them from South America I do not know as the export of Alpacas, like the export of Cinchona seeds from South America was forbidden. Charles Ledger received £15,000 for the Alpacas he had imported into Sydney.

BORN LONDON AMMARCHES IS

In 1884 Charles Ledger moved to a farm around 39kms from Goulburn NSW. He lost his fortune in bank failures in the early 1890s. However, the Dutch government granted an annuity of £100 a year in 1897. He died in 1905 at Leichhardt and was buried at Rookwood.

Mark Bundy also mentioned to me that there is a link between Rookwood and the sinking of the Titanic. One of the crew on that ill fated maiden voyage of the Titanic in April 1912 was stoker named William John Murdoch (also recorded on some records as "Murdock"). From my investigation into Murdoch's rescue there are conflicting stories and some question about how he survived as he would have been below decks working as a stoker when the ship hit the iceberg. However, he did survive and continued working on ships. He and his family migrated to Australia where he worked on coastal ships between Sydney and Newcastle. Murdoch passed away in 1941 and is also buried at Rookwood.

The club also gave \$500 Woolworths vouchers to 25 local community members affected by the floods funded by a Rotary District grant.




