Flight Paths Concerns

Concerns have been raised over the five proposed flight paths for the new Western Sydney International Airport at Badgerys Creek, to be called Nancy Bird Walton, which will see some flights over the Hawkesbury.

The airport, set to open in 2026, will operate 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Federal MP for Macquarie Susan Templeman said she welcomed the release of the preliminary flight paths with detailed information and transparency but acknowledged that a number of the flight paths impact the Blue Mountains and Hawkesbury.

"These are not the same flight paths that were included in the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) of 2015, which had every incoming flight pass over Blaxland," she said.

"While some people may feel relief, others will be surprised and concerned to see their area Impacted."

The flight paths were released by Infrastructure Minister Catherine King who said they were designed to minimize flights over residential areas, particularly during the night.

She said the community can provide feedback on the draft EIS during a formal public exhibition period following its release.

"This feedback will be considered as we finalise the flight path design ahead of the new airport starting operations by late 2026."

According to details contained on the website https://www.wsiflightpaths.gov.au/

Departures from the Nancy Bird Walton International airport could result in 2 to 6 departures flying over Bligh Park and Windsor areas. The biggest impact from the proposal will be the areas of Pitt Town, Ebenezer, Cattai and Lower Portland which will be under a flightpath for arrivals meaning 8 to 19 flights a day.

Susan Templeman said: "In releasing these flight paths, I have demanded that accurate and detailed information be available to us all... we need to have time to fully understand the flight paths before being asked to respond to an Environment Impact Statement (EIS).

"I encourage everyone in the Mountains and Hawkesbury to access the information at www. wsiflightpaths.gov.au

"Anyone who does not have internet access should contact my office so we can distribute the hard copy information I expect to be available from the Department of Infrastructure shortly. As we digest the impact of the preliminary flight paths, I know people will feel angry. I know people will be upset. I also know

we need to work together as a community to have effective input into this process."

Community information and feedback sessions have been organised, the nearest are at Parramatta (Thursday 20th July from 3pm to 8pm and Civic Gallery and Blacktown on Saturday 22nd July 11am to 4pm Max Webber Library.

Plans for a second International airport for Sydney at Badgerys Creek were first announced in 1986

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HOUSE FIRE

A Go Fund me page has been started by a concerned resident at the Gables for the Shah family who lost everything in a house fire on Friday 23rd June.

Riverstone Fire and Rescue crew attended the blaze in Hypero St, Gables alongside NSW Rural Fire Service crews from Box Hill Nelson and Oakville.

Crews who arrived at 1pm were confronted with a huge fire engulfing the two storey house. Four people had evacuated from the home prior to fire crews arrival. Firefighters immediately set to work attacking the fire.

According to a post from Riverstone FRNSW due to the severity of the blaze the incident was raised to a 2nd Alarm with further fire crews requested. At the height of the blaze 10 fire trucks and crews were in attendance

including Windsor FRNSW, Kellyville FRNSW and Mt Druitt FRNSW and RFS units from Rouse Hill Brigade, Round Corner and Kellyville RFS. Crews stayed until 10pm ensuring the fire did not spread and the fire was fully extinguished.

Fire and Rescue said it was a reminder that working smoke alarms help save lives.

Investigations into the cause are being undertaken by NSW Rural Fire Service and The Hills Police Area Command but it is believed that water on an electrical recliner masy have caused a short circuit and ensuing blaze.

She said: "One of our beautiful Gable family members lost their home to a freak house fire. Thankfully everyone was evacuated safely but their home and belongings could not be saved.... if you could please contribute even a few \$\$. It will go a long way to helping the family, whether it be for food, clothing, accommodation or anything else they may need."



TEEN CHARGED

A 17-year-old arrested at his home in North Kellyville on Friday 23rd June 2 has been charged after an alleged stabbing incident in Macquarie Park earlier this month.

His arrest follows the arrest of five teenagers at Cherrybrook Metro Station shortly after the alleged incident.

Police say that emergency services were called to a park in Herring Road, Macquarie Park, following reports of a brawl just before 5.30pm on Sunday 11th June 2023.

Officers from Ryde Police Area Command located a 14-year-old boy suffering a stab wound at a nearby railway station. He was taken to hospital in a critical condition.

It's alleged the injured boy was involved in a fight with a group of teens at the park before fleeing to the railway station where he was allegedly stabbed by one of the teens.

A crime scene was established at both locations, and investigation commenced into the circumstances surrounding the incident under Strike Force Gorinski.

Following inquiries, five boys, aged 13, 14, 15, 17, and 17, were arrested and charged. They remain before the courts.

The North Kellyville 17-year-old has been charged with wound person with intent to cause grievous bodily harm.

TRUCKIE ARRESTED

A 41-year-old man was arrested on Monday (26th June) after a truck allegedly overtook other motorists in a dangerous manner on Old Northern Road at Glenorie four days earlier..

Officers from The Hills Police Area Command received a report of a truck driving in a dangerous manner, including performing an illegal overtaking manoeuvre on the Old Northern Road at Glenorie at about 1pm on Friday (23rd June).

A message was broadcasted over police radio across the north-west and western Sydney area as officers commenced inquiries to locate the truck. Officers from Traffic and Highway Patrol Command then became aware of the incident and commenced inquiries to identify the driver of the vehicle.

Following extensive inquiries, investigators attended a trucking company in Revesby just after 8am on Monday 26th June.

A 41-year-old man was arrested at the location and taken to Bankstown Police Station.

MAN CHARGED

A 41-year-old Schofields man has been charged with a number of offences relating to the theft of tools and other property in and around the Hills Area. Officers from the Hills Police Areas Command executed a Search Warrant at home in Glenhaven Wednesday, 21st June with the assistance of North West Metro Operation Support Group.

Police recovered a large amount of property believed to be stolen from a work vehicle in Bella Vista.

Police Boundary Changes By BEV JORDAN

Changes to the boundaries to local Police
Area Commands will see The Hills Area
Command taking responsibility for covering
the suburbs of Glenhaven and Cherrybrook.



The changes to the boundaries will take effect from Tuesday July 4th. Currently Glenhaven and Cherrybrook are covered by police from the Ryde Area Command.

The move has been welcomed as it now means major sites like the Anglican Retirement Villages which are just 3 minutes from Castle Hill police station will not have to wait for police from Ryde who are stationed more than 30 minutes from the retirement village.

While The Hills is gaining two new suburbs the changes will shift the command's area further north and see Parramatta Police covering the areas of North Parramatta, Oatlands, Northmead and parts of North Rocks which have been the responsibility of The Hills PAC for many years.

The realignment of the policing boundaries make geographical sense in relation to the area's police station at Castle Hill.

Instead of having the border between The Hills and Ryde PAC at Old Northern Rd it has been moved to Pennant Hills Rd which will

mean The Hills PAC gains 50 sqm including schools (including Oakhill College, Cherrybrook High, Pacific Hills and Pennant Hills High) retirement villages and shopping centres.

Officers will be able to focus on the areas of Castle Hill, Dural, Pennant Hills and Cherrybrook which had previously been covered by Ryde PAC.

The Hills Area Commander, Supt Darrin Batchelor welcomed the change saying: "The changes will result in better service delivery to the residents of Cherrybrook and Glenhaven.

"It will make for faster response times," he said.

He also said it would expand the work of The Hills PAC's vulnerable persons unit and work with the elderly and the youth liaison team. The Hills PAC.

On The Hills PAC social media a statement reads: "Since its inception, NSWPF has undergone several boundary changes and we will continue to evaluate our organisational structure and overall performance to ensure

we deliver/provide the best services to our communities.

"Local police will be dealing with local problems. Where officers are better connected with their communities and know and understand their communities, they are better able to work with and serve those communities...We're confident that this is a long-term solution that will benefit everyone.

"The police service you receive will not change and our Police Commands will continue to be accessible to all. Staffing aligns with resource needs so communities continue to receive a prompt police response."

Castle Hill State MP Mark Hodges welcomed the boundary adjustment saying: "The boundary changes make a sensible geographical adjustment which will now enable our front-line police to attend to matters in suburbs closer to the Castle Hill Command. I look forward to continuing working with the Police Command in the service of residents who reside or work within the new boundaries."

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Teacher's New Book Looking To Make Waves

Local English teacher Clive Thomas's latest novel, '39: The Ship In The Storm combines a number of his lifelong passions.

Mixing his interests of sailing, World War II history and music in an unconventional way, '39 The Ship In The Storm is an intriguing historical mystery about a commandeered British navy ship that disappeared in 1939, only to reappear 100 years later in a world where relations between the UK and US are strained.

The idea for the book was originally inspired by the Queen song '39. "The idea of a ship going away and coming back to find everything else had moved on 100 years, I thought that was quite interesting," said Clive. "What would happen if they suddenly appeared there? How would people's reaction be to the ship? Coupled with my interest in WWII history, that gave me the impetus to write this story."

'39: The Ship In The Storm is Clive's fourth published book, and was largely written during COVID lockdowns that allowed Clive to take an unofficial sabbatical. Inspired by the works of mystery authors like Dan Brown, Clive's conception of the story would regularly change while creating the manuscript: "It seemed to evolve as I was writing, and I couldn't plan it all in advance. I just carried on creating and felt it out."

Having grown up in rural England, Clive's own nautical experiences are lifelong. He began sailing on the lakes and rivers of England and has since sailed over the world, including in the Caribbean where Clive taught the art of mastering the waves for six months when he was younger.

In those varied travels, Clive has worked more than 20 occupations. His wide array of experiences often dictate the content of his books, which he writes from his long-time home in Galston.

Camp Caribbean and Travelling Tales are such works; the former draws on Clive's experience teaching sailing in the Caribbean to create a semi-autobiographical story, while the latter is a collection of entertaining stories from his travels.

Clive's latest novel further expands upon his long relationship with the sea. He said: "It's something about the fact that the sky is so vast and the ocean is so huge that you just feel like you're part of nature."

It's a sensation that he loves to share - each Wednesday, he volunteers with the Making Waves Foundation to teach disadvantaged




teens how to sail while instilling in them key social skills.

Writing and literature brings Clive a great amount of joy, appreciating its value as a creative outlet: "It's about being able to express myself in a way that wouldn't come out verbally, and really being able to provide a visual image," he said. "I enjoy teaching creative writing as well, getting students to think about what happens in a story so that they can better understand it."

Hills Model Headed to Melbourne

18-year old Hills local Kiri Olsen is headed to Melbourne this weekend to compete in Top Model Australia's 2023 National Final as one of NSW's most promising young models.

The final will see Kiri and nine other finalists from New South Wales compete for the chance to head to London for the Worldwide Top Model competition, where the winner will be able to walk in London Fashion Week.

Despite the high stakes, Kiri is really excited for the weekend: "It's pretty stiff competition, but it's okay. You meet lots of amazing people and everyone's unique in their own different way. It's gonna be a fun and exciting time."

While Kiri is down in Melbourne for the National Final, she'll be wearing the clothes of Kyah Halitta, a Sydney-based fashion designer who puts emphasis on sustainability in the clothing that she designs.

Kiri connects with Kyah's mission to make the fashion industry more sustainable, putting more thought into the clothes that everyone wears. "I've been working with her for a couple of years," Kiri says, "and being able to work with her and advocate her clothes is very important to me."

Kiri began modelling in 2020 as a form of self-expression: "Whenever I see myself in photos, I feel a lot more confident in everyday life. Having the ability to say 'That's who I am', it really helps to build character."

In 2021, Kiri participated in the debut Teen Miss Runway event in Sydney, where she was able to make a lot of connections with makeup artists and other models that connected her to the modelling industry: "I'm still very close to lots of those people, I still do collaborations and work with them to get our image across the industry," she says.

Not only was the experience invaluable, Kiri took home first place in the Teen Miss Runway event. She found it hard to believe: "It was surreal, just to think that the judges loved me, loved my work and the organic photos. It gave me a lot of confidence to continue and pursue modelling after that," she says.

Although the whole modelling process is enjoyable to her, it's the feeling of walking the runway that really invigorates Kiri. "I don't know how to explain it. During the runway, it's a whole different experience, it's surreal. You walk down it and see the professional photos later, and it's amazing. Every single time I look at it, I'm still gobsmacked - it's an incredible feeling."

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Community Radio Carries On

Hawkesbury Radio is continuing to serve the community by evolving into a fully online radio station, despite losing their licence from the Australian Communications and Media Authority in 2017. From the site of Windsor's old water tank and tower, the broadcast runs 24/7 and can now be accessed from anywhere in the world.

Despite the difficulties that Hawkesbury Radio faced when losing their community radio licence, the transition to online is far from the first major change that Steve Wilkins, current President and Treasurer of Hawkesbury Radio, has seen at the station since he began in 2004.

"When I started, pretty much everyone was using CDs," he says. "I'd walk in with two cases, and you feel your arms getting longer as you walk towards the studio. And then you get someone ringing up to say 'Oh, can you play such and such a song?' You'd say 'Yep, it's here somewhere,' and have to flick through all of them."

Steve believes that evolving with the times is a necessary step for the station: "It's an exciting time for radio. Everything gets reinvented, and I think we're in for a reinvention of music as well. It'll be fresh, invigorating and will bring people back to radio, and it will be what it's always been."

Nowadays, the Hawkesbury Radio studio is filled with technology that Steve says is

"lightyears" ahead of what they had twenty years ago — that technology enabling the station to persevere, providing companionship and entertainment to the people of the Hawkesbury.

The relationship between the station and its listeners goes both ways, with Hawkesbury Radio providing essential information in times of natural disaster. "Everybody wants to know exactly what's going on, and radio is becoming relied upon as that source of information," Steve says.

He recalls a time in 2019 where he stayed on air for seven hours to help provide people information about the huge Windsor Downs fire: "We were getting phone calls from people who were worried about their properties, and they were searching for that information on Facebook and weren't finding it. We were able to track a lot of the fire, thanks to input from our listeners who could tell us what was going on."

Through its transition to an exclusively online broadcaster, Hawkesbury Radio can now



fully operate on its own terms and better serve its community. Whether you're five minutes away in the Windsor Mall or thousands of kilometres away in Europe, the station is only a few clicks away from playing on your phone.

"It's made better by the people and environment of the Hawkesbury - it has that real sense of identity and location," comments Steve. "People in the Hawkesbury are a part of the Hawkesbury. It presents that mix of urban, rural bush and everything else. There's so much to see and do here that people don't even realise!"

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Hills Winter Sleepout 2023

When you are feeling cold at home spare a thought for the thousands of people sleeping rough, in their cars or couch surfing.

The annual Hills Winter Sleep Out is now in its tenth year and aims to give people an understanding of what homeless people face every night.

This year's event at Bella Vista Farm spans from 4pm Saturday, August 5th to 10am Sunday, August 6th and raises funds for Hills Community Aid's Homeless Prevention Initiative and StreetMed which offers First Aid services and food to people living rough.

Mici Beer, Executive Officer at Hills Community Aid said since 2020 there has been a 186% increase in the number of people contacting HCA for financial support services, "this includes people experiencing homelessness, DV, and financial hardship".

"Over the past year (2023 financial year) we have had 6,027 calls from people requiring financial assistance," she said " (and) we spent \$6,980 on food vouchers to assist people who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless."

She said one woman receiving help had escaped a DV situation and is still in recovery mode. Even though she works full time and receives allowances for her son who has

special needs she is struggling.

Mici said money raised at last year's Sleep Out has given the client some "breathing space" and prevented her and her son from being homeless.

Founder of The Hills Winter Sleep Out Dr. Michelle Byrne said it had been an eye opener for people taking part and the funds raised were needed more than ever.


"With the increased cost of living coupled with soaring energy costs, more and more

own community," she said.

"The sleep out is an opportunity to raise much needed funds to help those who are homeless or one step away from becoming homeless. We are sleeping out so others, including women and children, don't have to."

Speakers from The Big Issue magazine will again come and talk to participants about how selling the magazine has made a difference to their lives.







Dave who has been selling the Big Issue at Parramatta for 26 years says it has enabled him to stop sleeping rough and get a roof over his head.

Michelle Byrne said: "Listening and talking to the Big Issue vendors over the years has been an eye opener in understanding homelessness and what it is like not to have a permanent roof over your head.

"What has stuck in my mind over the years was something Vendor Dave said about the difference a smile and hello makes in the lives of those doing it tough and how we can create a kinder world that includes everyone. "

Cris Cleary from StreetMed says hypothermia and exposure are a real thing for those that don't have the ability to have a roof over their heads at night.

"This time of year is always challenging for our homeless friends, especially with minimal to no respite from the relentless cold weather. Over the last few years since Covid and the cost of living pressures we have seen the demands on our services rise exponentially whilst donations of both goods and money have declined. A no win situation for all concerned. That is why this year's 10th Hills Winter Sleepout is so important to get behind and support. As every single cent goes towards helping those who need it most. '

CASE STUDIES

One woman helped recently is 72 years old and had been couch surfing with friends and relatives for over two months.

She had to move out from where she had been living for the past five years in the granny flat at her son's home due to family violence and financial

She was finding the application for Housing to be confusing and having no success - we advocated for her and applied to Uniting Ageing Westmead for Housing for her - she was granted a brand new unit and was incredibly grateful.

However she still needed to pay bond and rent in advance. Hills Homeless Prevention Initiative funds ensured she secured this unit. The flexibility in being able to apply for this program and have her application assessed the same day ensured she could accept the offer asap and did not risk losing the opportunity.

Marg (not her real name), approached HCA in July last year after fleeing her home and staying in hotels and temporary accommodation for several weeks. Marg has 16-year-old twins and an 18-year-old son with disabilities. She worked hard and earned around \$75k per year, so she was not eligible for many government / or other agencies crisis support programs.

HCA assisted her with Woolworths vouchers, which freed up some funds for other expenses. She was also provided with two weeks' rent (HHPI)) and paid her initial power bill from the Bridging the Gap program (as she did not qualify for EAPA vouchers).



Hawkesbury Regional Gallery



The Hawkesbury Regional Gallery forms part of the NSW Regional Galleries which aims to support regional and NSW artists and to create opportunities for these talented individuals to showcase their work. The exhibitions at the Hawkesbury Regional Gallery are constantly changing, bringing new work and diverse art forms to audiences. The exhibitions are mostly curated in-house by staff and volunteers, however touring exhibitions from regional and state galleries and other organisations are part of the Gallery's program.

The current exhibition is ArtExpress, a joint program between the NSW Department of Education and the NSW Education Standards Authority, showcasing an exemplary selection of art work created by HSC students. Having never been to ArtExpress before I was blown away by the incredible artwork produced by high school students and the different use of mediums including painting, drawing, photomedia, textiles and fibre, ceramics, sculpture, printmaking and short films. The artworks are all completely different yet together are an interesting reflection on what is important to this generation of young people and how they perceive the world around them. Many of the artworks explore the human condition, the chaos and meaninglessness

around us and the challenges migrants face in finding where they belong. Other artworks explored the importance of understanding our roots and how relationships with our grandparents and parents have shaped us. Some artworks tackled complex societal issues such as homelessness, domestic violence and mental illness whilst others challenged the way women are perceived. The importance of the environment and its destruction as a result of industrialisation was also explored.

Three local students' artwork also appear in ArtExpress. Maddison Garton (Arndell Anglican College) through her painting explores childhood memories of her Oma's garden inspiring others to reminisce on their own special childhood memories. Zoe Capel's (Richmond High School) artwork entitled "The usurpation" reflects on how creatures have been forced out of their natural habitat and into urban areas as a result of the floods as well as the role creatures play no matter how small they are. Stella Janssens (Castle Hill High) explores through the use of ceramics the relationship she shared with her father and the impact he left on her and the memories created by the objects he left behind despite his death whilst she was young. Such powerful artwork!









Artexpress is on exhibition at the Hawkesbury Regional Gallery until August 13 and it is worth visiting and seeing the world through the eyes of our young people. It will challenge your thinking!

The Hawkesbury Regional Gallery apart from running exhibitions also runs artist and curator talks, art classes/workshops for adults and children as well as a school holiday workshop programs.

For wood mounts he finds branches and large pieces on walks around his neighbourhood. He purchases the cork from an orchid supplier. Currently he estimates Tillandsias make up 80% of his collection, but he also likes Billbergias, Dykias, Neoregelias,

Aechmeas – really any bromeliad with colour, sculpture or unusual form.

Harold will give a hands-on demonstration during his presentation at the meeting on 'how to mount Tillandsia'. There will also be our regular meeting activities such as competitions, raffle, Show & Tell, and a more recent activity called just "Show" for people who would just like to share a plant with others without it being critically judged.

Highlights of the plan include:

- \$3.8 million on providing street lighting to create safer environments;

soldiers who fought for our country."

The trip will come after her Year 11 exams and before she transitions into Year 12.

THAI GREEN CHICKEN CURRY

By MEREDITH PANETTA

(from Panetta Mercato - Baulkham Hills)

Ingredients

225g new potatoes, cut into chunks 100g green beans trimmed and halved 1 tbsp vegetable or sunflower oil

1 garlic clove chopped

1 tbsp thai green curry paste

400ml can coconut milk

2 tsp thai fish sauce

1 tsp caster sugar

450 g boneless chicken thigh fillets, but into 1 cm pieces

2 lime leaves shredded

1 handful of basil leaves chopped

Boiled rice to serve

Method

- Put 225g new potatoes, cut into chunks, in a pot of boiling water and cook for 5 minutes.
- Add 100g trimmed and halved green beans and cook for a further 3 minutes, by which time both should be just tender but not too soft. Drain and put to one side.
- In a wok or large frying pan, heat 1 tbsp vegetable or sunflower oil until very hot, then drop in 1 chopped garlic clove and cook until golden, this should take only a few seconds. Don't let it go very dark or it will spoil the
- Spoon in the curry paste and stir it around for a few seconds to begin to cook the spices and release all the flavours.
- Next, pour in the coconut milk and let it come to a boil. Stir in the fish sauce, caster sugar and chicken. Turn the heat down to a simmer and cook, covered, for about 8 minutes until the chicken is cooked.
- Tip in the potatoes and beans and let them warm through in the hot coconut milk, then add the lime leaves.
- Add the basil leaves.
- Scatter with lime to garnish and serve immediately with boiled rice.

Quiet Hour Coming to Hawkesbury Service NSW Centres

Member for Hawkesbury, Robyn Preston MP has welcomed the introduction of a permanent Quiet Hour at Richmond and Castle Hill Service NSW Centres.

Ms Preston said eight Service Centres across the State were selected for a trial of Quiet Hour by the NSW Liberal and Nationals Government in 2022.

"The trial was very successful and 97 per cent of people surveyed found it a positive experience," said Ms Preston. "It's wonderful that a permanent Quiet Hour is now being rolled out to 107 Service Centres across NSW, including at Richmond on Wednesdays from 10:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. and at Castle Hill on Wednesdays from 2:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m.

People in our own community who may be sensitive to light or overstimulated by sound can now complete Service NSW transactions in a more comfortable and safer environment."

During Quiet Hour, the volume of music and ticket announcements is reduced, lighting is dimmed and customers are asked to minimise conversations and put their mobile phones on silent mode.

Robyn Preston said Service NSW staff will also undertake disability awareness training to help provide customers living with disability and their carers, extra support during each visit.

"I couldn't be prouder of our Service NSW staff and the world-class customer service they provide to everyone in our community," Ms Preston said.

"Introducing a Quiet Hour is a small step forward, but for Service NSW customers living with disability

it is a big step towards creating a supportive and inclusive environment."

Recently, I had the privilege of meeting Michelle Lee, an incredible woman, an Aussie adventurer, speaker and mindset mentor. She holds a lot of titles for the feats that she has accomplished. In 2019, Michelle completed the Talisker Whisky Atlantic Challenge, one of the world's toughest challenges. Michelle completed an ocean row of 4,700 kilometres. Her long journey started in the Canary Islands. It took Michelle 68 days to reach English Harbour, Antigua, in the Caribbean. On completing this challenge Michelle became the first Australian woman to row any ocean solo.

More recently, this year Michelle became the first woman ever to row solo across the Pacific Ocean, unassisted without stopping. Michelle set off from Mexico in her eight-metre carbon fibre boat named Australian

Maid on 8 August 2022. The journey took Michelle across the equator and into the path of five hurricanes, four cyclones, and two persistent sharks. Michelle arrived in Port Douglas on 5 April 2023.

Michelle has also completed many amazing feats on land, such as the 'classic' long-distance Himalayan trek (over 160km) in just 9 days, and the famous Kokoda trail in just 5 days.

I had the opportunity and the privilege to speak with Michelle recently, and I expressed my personal gratitude and congratulations to her. Michelle's story is one of pure courage, dedication, determination, endurance and willpower. I recognise the extraordinary achievements of a truly amazing member of our community, and I congratulate Michelle on her achievements.

Bike Riding Made Easier in Castle Hill Showground

Walking and cycling through Castle Hill Showground has been made much easier thanks to a new shared walking and biking pathway.

The 500-metre missing link connects Showground Road to Carrington Road in Castle Hill and was jointly funded by the NSW Government in association with The Hills Shire Council.

The project received \$440,000 from the Government's Metropolitan Greenspace Program which aims to increase community access by creating high-quality green spaces and networks that connect town centres, public transport hubs, and major residential areas.

"This new shared pathway makes Castle Hill more accessible to our community, which is absolutely fantastic," Mayor of The Hills Shire, Dr Peter Gangemi said. "With the creation of this link, pedestrians and cyclists will be able to use a pathway to easily access the local facilities, grounds, and the Metro Station within Castle Hill Showground. "They can also visit homes and businesses along Carrington Road and ride or walk to key centres in The Hills, including Norwest Business Park and Castle Hill CBD.


"I want to thank the NSW Government for their contribution to this project, which has improved pedestrian safety and access into the Showground, which people use daily to commute, play sports, shop at the local farmers' markets, see local theatre, and attend larger events and festivals."

Approximately 200 trees and various native shrubs have also been planted along the new pathway, providing additional shade

and creating a picturesque loop through the grounds, which is home to a dog park, horse stalls, a theatre, a sporting oval and various buildings for hire. This new shared pathway also forms part of the overall Cattai Creek Corridor, which includes connections for pedestrians and cyclists between Middleton Avenue through Carrington Road and onto Showground Road.

Castle Hill's rugby league ace Tas humbled by OAM

Bortolo 'Tas' Baitieri is a true blood rugby league diehard. His list of achievements runs as long as his remarkable league career as a player, coach and as a very senior administrator across countries and organisations, including World Cups and the Commonwealth Games.

Fondly known as Tas - after the Tasmanian Devil in the Bugs Bunny cartoons - the Castle Hill local received an OAM for services to rugby league through administrative roles during the recent King's Birthday Honours List.

"When I was first contacted, I thought someone is taking me for a ride," said Baitieri, who turns 66 on July 14. "It was until I got an email confirmation from the Office of the Governor General, that it started to sink in.

"I am obviously humbled and very appreciative of the consideration and would expect Guido (his Dad), looking from above being very proud."

Baitieri is the Chair of the Australian Universities RL and on the board of the Heritage League – NSW.

Baitieri played for Penrith Panthers (1977-1981/1985) and Canterbury Bulldogs (1982-1984). He was the development manager of the International Rugby League from 1999-2018. He played a key role in the development of the sport in France in the 1980s, being player/coach of Paris Chatillion and then coach of the French national team.

He was CEO of the PSG league team, and a director of the Centenary 2008 RL World Cup. Baitieri, the French group manager at the 2013 World Cup, was the technical director of the Pacific Games in 2007, 2015 and 2019.

Asked to pick his biggest achievement, the grandfather of six said: "It is the 1998 World Youth Games in Moscow in 1998, which had over 7,500 athletes from 140 countries.

"Alexander Kolikof, the chair of the Russian RL, asked if rugby league could attend as a demonstration sport and was successful. Then, Russia was like a forbidden fruit and difficult to deal with, language barriers, visas, etc. We got permission from the ARL to take three under-16 teams from Australia.

"With support from Dennis Ward, the QRL Coaching and Development Manager, and Martin Meredith, the NSW Coaching & Development Manager, we returned with gold, silver and bronze medals. Ken Hay and Mick Liubinskas were among the coaches and managers.

"What we managed to achieve at the time was a miracle with a travelling party of 82 - imagine all the red tape we were confronted with and the many boxes we had to tick. But, yes, it was worth it in the end."

Baitieri loves the sport: "The mission was and still is today for people to realise their dreams. Find the energy within to learn, improve and realise the unthinkable."

A Blacktown lad, Baitieri first played for Patrician Brothers under-10s before moving to St Dominic's College, Kingswood, in Year 11. He was graded with the Panthers President's Cup side in 1976 and stayed until 1981 when he switched to the Bulldogs.

"During this period as the game wasn't full-time, I, along with Panthers team-mate Kevin Pobjie, travelled to England for one month before moving to France to play for Paris Chatillion. I returned to Paris for the following three years, taking on coaching and playing roles from mid-1985 until 1991.

"When a kid from Blacktown finds himself in Paris, it wouldn't be too hard to fathom, why anyone would want to live there!," Baitieri recalled. "My 10 years there was life-changing."

He got into admin roles when France hosted the International RL Board meeting in Paris in 1985 where Australia, PNG, England, and New Zealand attended. "The French RL chairman Jacques Soppelsa summoned me (being Parisbased) to be the interpreter. France was the only non-English-speaking country that played the game back then. My (administrative) journey then started."

Baitieri is married to Frenchwoman Michèle and has three sons, Nicolas, Matthew, and Jason.

He explained how he got the moniker Tas. "My name Bortolo was difficult to comprehend, say or pronounce back in 1963 when we started primary school. Being Italian with unusual lunches, we drew attention and little intolerance from other kids in the schoolyard.

"We had a number of schoolyard battles over the years and one day, I got called into the principal's office with a bloody school shirt and no buttons. The principal said I was like the devil, fighting all the time, arguing, and looking for trouble. I didn't buy into that theory as it takes two to tango!

"Anyway, the Bugs Bunny show was a favourite kids show during this period and the Tasmanian Devil a popular character so, from the Tasmanian Devil to Tas, the nickname started all those years ago."

COMMUNITY MINDED

Some thirty odd years ago I had the privilege of sitting alongside a very community minded member of our local community. The occasion was a Citizenship Ceremony held on Australia Day at Castle Hill. I was, at the time, a member of the Australia Day Committee of Baulkham Hills Shire Council

The lady in question was Connie Lowe, widow of former Hills Shire Councillor, Harvey Lowe, after whom the Harvey Lowe pavilion at Castle Hill Showground was named. Connie and I started to engage in conversation.

It transpired that Connie had confused me with a colleague of mine who also worked on the same publication as myself at the time. This colleague and myself shared the same surname but he wrote his articles under the name of "Allegro". Having then sorted out this confusion. I would now like to tell readers about the late Connie Lowe who was born in 1900.

Connie moved to Lower Portland on the Hawkesbury River in 1931 after marrying Harvey Lowe in that year. Moving from the inner suburbs of Sydney to the outlying districts along the Hawkesbury Connie found life so different. At that time there was no sewerage or electricity and the Lowes had to make use of kerosene lamps. Travelling in the district at the time was risky and Connie related an episode which occurred during their honeymoon when the Hawkesbury was in flood. She said, "We were rowed across the river at Lower Portland in a rowboat, then in another little boat by a little lad who later became a Councillor, Albert Watkins, and his black dog in the front of the rowboat". Albert told her "Everything's going to turn out alright if you got a dog on board."

Talking of councillors and travel in the district also reminded me that Connie's newly acquired father-in-law was an original councillor on Baulkham Hills Shire Council in 1906, Councillor Robert Lowe. In those early days it took him three days to travel to a council meeting and another three days to travel back staying overnight at Box Hill on both trips. The house which Councillor Robert Lowe stayed overnight still stands close to the new Carmel Village Shopping Centre on Windsor Rd at Box Hill. Connie often mentioned about the busy life and times of Clr. Robert Lowe, he still had time to have 13 children whilst Connie and Harvey had one child, a daughter.





On one occasion, whilst travelling home from a Baulkham Hills Shire Council meeting late at night by car, Harvey

and Connie drove using a back road behind Dargle which was very treacherous. Their headlights failed and, to get home safely, Connie had to walk along the road in front of the car shining a torch whilst Harvey drove very slowly in low gear behind her.

Now, having named this article "Community Minded Connie", I guess I should mention Connie's involvement with various community groups during her long life. During the 2nd World War, Connie received a letter of thanks from Queen Elizabeth (wife of King George VI) who later became Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother. The letter was to thank Connie and the ladies of Lower Portland for the supply of baby clothes to be donated to children who had been bombed out of house and home during the bombing of London during the war. Connie had also organised fund raising for people affected in the Kellyville, Rouse Hill and Lower Portland bushfires during 1939. She was also the organist at the Lower Portland Uniting Church for around sixty years and had been a member of the CWA and also did volunteer work at the School of Arts.


Connie and Harvey Lowe were strong advocates for their community. The Hills and Hawkesbury regions benefitted from their tireless work. Harvey died in 1978 and Connie passed away in 2002 aged 101 and she remained active in the community well into her later years.

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
